Second Pan-American Scientific Congress Convened Yesterday

Washington, Dec. 27.—More than 200 statesmen, educators, scientists and publicists from the South and Central American republics are here for the Second Pan-American scientific congress which convened today and continues until January 3. In addition to the official delegates of the United States, several hundred private citizens will participate in the program which is directed toward the general subject of closer relations between the Americas.

The first Pan-American scientific congress was held at Santiago, Chile, 1908, when Washington was selected as the place in which to hold the second this year. Eduardo Suarez, Chilean ambassador to Washington, was chosen president of the congress and will preside at the conference next week. Vice President Marshall, Secretary Lansing and Ambassador Suarez will welcome the delegates on the first day of the congress and responses will be made by chairmen of the various delegations.

It is expected that President Wilson will return to Washington from his honeymoon in time to address the members at a special meeting at the Pan-American building on the night of January 5. Arrangements have been made for giving the first Pan-American reception ever held in the White House on the evening of January 7th.

Congress at its last session appropriated \$50,000 to cover expenses and authorized President Wilson to extend the invitations. All the American republics accepted, some sending as many as fifteen delegates and none less than three. In addition to these there have come many representatives of leading universities and scientific societies and a number of notables invited by the Carnegie endowment. The Argentine government appropriated \$90,000 for the expenses of its delegation of nine men who stand high in educational and scientific affairs in South America. The Chilean government appointed fifteen delegates.

Delegation From U. S.

The delegation of the United States, headed by George Gray of Delaware, includes William Phillips, third assistant secretary of state, who is chairman of the executive committee of arrangements; James Brown Scott, secretary of the Carnegie endowment; William H. Welch, president of the National Academy of Science; John Barrett, director general of the Pan-American union; Brig. Gen. W. H. Bixby, U. S. A., retired; Philander P. Clayton, commissioner of education; Major General William C. Gorgas, surgeon general, U. S. Army; William H. Holmes, Smithsonian institute; Hennen Jennings, mining engineer; George M. Fernald, department of agriculture; L. S. Rowe, president of the American Academy of political and social science; Robert S. Woodward, president of the Brashers American society of mechanical engineers; William Wallace Campbell, American association for the advance of science; Richard C. Cabot, professor in the Harvard medical school; Henry B. Fine, Princeton University; Henry S. Graves, chief forester of the United States; Alfred P. Thom of the Southern railway, and Charles D. Walcott, director of the Smithsonian institution.

The work of arranging the program has been done at the Pan-American building here, under the direction of John Barrett, director general of the Pan-American union, as secretary general of the congress, assisted by Dr. Glen Levin Swiggert, professor of romance languages at the University of Tennessee, an assistant secretary general.

Subjects Discussed. The subjects to be discussed have been divided into the following sections: Anthropology, Astronomy, Meteorology and Seismology, conservation of natural resources, agriculture, irrigation and forestry, education, engineering, international law, public law, jurisprudence, mining and metallurgy, economic geology and applied chemistry, public health and medical science, transportation, commerce, finance and taxation. These sections in turn have been subdivided into sub-sections and it is expected that when the congress is fully under way there will be in progress at the same time thirty or forty meetings. To care for these gatherings most of the public halls in Washington have been engaged.

On the evening of the opening day a reception by Secretary Lansing and the American delegates will be given in the hall of the Americas in the Pan-American building. The visiting foreigners will be the guests of the United States government at a banquet the last evening of the congress.

After the first day the nine sections will meet separately to outline the work of their sub-sections. Throughout the remainder of the meeting these sub-sections will conduct their discussions independently in different parts of the city. It is estimated that more than 1,000 papers will be read during the conferences on subjects ranging from problems of everyday life to the latest developments of modern science. Sixty delegates will come from countries where French, Spanish, Portuguese, and English are the common languages and in order that some may see what is being said a corps of interpreters has been engaged.

Many Social Events. Much of the planning of the social events scheduled for the two weeks has been done under the direction of Mrs. Robert Lansing, wife of the secretary of state, who heads a women's auxiliary committee of the congress. The committee is in charge of the social affairs of Washington and other cities.

Besides the opening reception Monday night there will be luncheons and afternoon receptions at the home of Secretary Lansing and Mrs. Lansing on Tuesday and Wednesday, December 28 and 29; a reception at the Smithsonian institute on Wednesday, December 28 and 29; a reception by the Chilean ambassador, December 30, a night at the theatre Friday, December 31; a reception by the governing board at the Pan-American building, Saturday night, January 1; the Pan-American reception at the White House, Friday night, January 7, and the farewell banquet the next evening.

Arrangements also have been made for excursions to Fort Meyer, Annapolis, Mount Vernon and perhaps to Philadelphia, Pittsburgh and New York. Special services will be held at many of the churches.

Eighteen of the twenty-one republics have organized associations subscribing to the principle of codified international law, and have sent delegates who will take part in the deliberations of the Pan-American institute of international law. This will be the inaugural meeting of the institute. The governing board of the Pan-American union has adopted at the suggestion of Ambassador Suarez, a resolution tendering the founders and members of the institute a vote of commendation and encouragement. When he offered the resolution recently the ambassador said: "The Foundations.

"As my colleagues are undoubtedly aware, in October, 1912, the foundations were laid in Washington for an organization of a most interesting character. There was born into the realm of scientific life the American institute of international law, the object of which is, briefly stated, to combine and utilize through a central organization in Washington and the cooperation of affiliated or corresponding associations in all the other American nations, the intellectual efforts of jurists and thinkers of the continent for the development of international law, the generalization of its principles and the adoption of a common standard to ensure the enforcement of law and justice among the countries of the New World. The corresponding or affiliated associations have already been organized in eighteen out of twenty-one American republics, and steps are being taken to constitute the other three.

"International law is not the patrimony of a single nation. It is the law of all nations, and must therefore be formed and assented to by all, and the cooperation of nations is essential to its enactment or amendment. Hence the enormous importance of an organization which has a brain and a voice in every one of the nations of America, whose action must be the fruit of continental thought.
