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BANDITS SURPRISED BY U.S. TROOPS AND COMPLETELY ROUTED

Villa Rushed Off in Carriage By Men After Receiving Injury That Rendered Him Entirely Helps less-Band is Scattered

THIRTY BANDITS LEFT DEAD ON FIELD AND FOUR AMERICANS HURT

By Forced Marches Americans Arrived at Ville Camp Without Knowledge of Enemy and First Volley Eired Was Complete Surprise.

(By Associated Press)
Columbus, New Mexico, March 31.—Villa's force estimated at five hundred men was defeated with about thirty killed at Sangeronimo ranch, Glucirero district, March twenty-ninth, by Colonel Dodd, according to an official report from General Pershing. Four Americans were slightly wounded. Col. Dodd, with about four infedred men of the seventh and tenth cavalry, completely surprised the villa force and scattered them, capturing arms and equipment. General Hernandez, Villa's second in command, was killed. A message from Lieutenant Colonel D. C. Cabell, General Pershing's chief of staff at San Geronimo ranch, said Villa was carried away in a carriage after the battle wounded and with his hip permenantly disabled. Before the battle the American forces rode through the night, traveling liftyfive miles in seventeen hours. The Mexicans were surprised in camp. Many were wounded at the first volley of the Americans. Villa, who was in a tent at the rear of the Mexican encampment, did not take part in the fighting, but left the direction of the buttle to Hernandez
