ANNUAL CONTESTS WILL DRAW CROWDS

ORATORICAL CONTESTS IN BELTON WILL ATTRACT MANY PEOPLE

ON FRIDAY NIGHT

Representatives From Various Schools in This Section Will Speak.

Some years ago the high schools of Anderson, Belton, Honca Path, and Williamston formed the O'Neal Oratorical Association. A medal is given to the boy who is best on declamation and to the girl who wins on recitation. A preliminary contest is held in each school and the winners are sent to Belton where the final test is made. More than fifty pupils took part in the various preliminary contests this year. The superintendents of the schools concerned and the president of the association met in Anderson last Saturday and arranged the program that will be carried out at Belton Friday evening, April 21, beginning at 7:30. The high school of Anderson has been admitted to the association, and a boy and a girl from that school will take part in the speaking on April 21. The interest in public speaking at the several schools has been greatly aroused by these annual contests.

To defray the expenses of the association, a small fee is charged at the door. Any school child in the county is at liberty to buy tickets in advance from these superintendents at a reduced rate.

It is desired that as many parents as possible attend the exercises at Belton next Friday evening, as the presence of the parents greatly encourages the children in their efforts.

The exercises will begin at 7:30 in order for the children to return home that night on the outgoing train.

KEEP THE GARDEN BUSY

Twenty-five by Seventy Foot Plot Will Produce Enough Vegetables For a Small Family

"Even the smallest back yard may be made to yield a supply of fresh vegetables for the family table at but slight expense if two or three crops are successively grown to keep the area occupied all the time, according to the garden specialists of the U. S. department of agriculture. People who would discharge a clerk if he did not work the year round will often cultivate a garden at no little trouble and expense and then allow the soil to lie idle from the time the first crop matures until the end of the season. Where a two or three crop system is used in connection with vegetables adapted to small areas, a space no larger than 25 by 70 feet will produce enough fresh vegetables for a small family. Corn, melons, cucumbers, and potatoes and other crops which require a large area should not be grown in a garden of this size. Half an acre properly cultivated with a careful crop rotation may easily produce \$100 worth of various garden crops in a year."

FREELEY CASE WILL BE HEARD ON MAY 1ST

EXECUTION ON APRIL 7 WAS STAID PENDING THE APPEAL

SUPREME COURT

Will Pass on Matter and Much Interest is Being Shown in Decision.

Solicitor Smith stated yesterday that the Dock Freeley case, which has been appealed to the supreme court, would be heard on the first Monday in May, the 1st. The solicitor has about completed his argument and it will go to the printers on Monday. Freeley, it will be remembered, was found guilty of murder of Mr. Dodd, the aged Hampton street merchant, in the last criminal court in Anderson. Sentence was passed on him, the date of the execution being set for April 7. However, this execution was stayed pending an appeal to the supreme court.
