## U. S. TELLS GERMANY SHE RELIES ON SCRUPULOUS EXECUTION NEW POLICY

### Declaration of Abandonment of Former Submarine Policy Accepted in Good Faith and Attention Called to Stand We'll Take in Future.

#### SECRETARY LANSING CABLES REPLY TO THE GERMAN NOTE

### Refused to Discuss Suggestion That Germany's Respect For Us on High Seas Should Be Contingent on Conduct Any Other Nation.

(By Associated Press.)

Washington, May 8.—The United States' answer to Germany's note was called by Secretary Lansing to Ambassador Geradt today. It informs the German government that the United States accepts Germany's "declaration of abandonment of former submarine policy." It added that the United States now relies upon a "scrupulous execution of Germany's altered policy to remove the principal danger of interruption of good relations existing between the two countries."

#### CONDUCT OF THE OTHER NATIONS NOT TO GOVERN SITUATION ON HIGH SEAS

With this acceptance is coupled a formal notice to Germany that the United States cannot for a moment tolerate such a policy. The suggestion that Germany's respect for United States citizens on high seas should be contingent upon the conduct of any other government affecting the rights of neutrals or non-combatants is part of a reply to Germany's assertion that she would reserve the complete liberty to change her decision unless the United States is successful in its efforts to break the British blockade.

Lansing in statement tonight said the greater part of Germany's note is devoted to matters the United States could not discuss with Berlin but he considered that Germany had yielded to our representations. He said we can have no reason to quarrel with her.

### WILL SEND SPY TO ENGLAND FOR TRIAL AS FORGER

Blacoin was formerly a member of the British parliament and a confessed spy. He recently escaped from the custody of the United States officers but was recaptured.

## No Decision Is Made On Withdrawal

#### In Conference at El Paso Status of Troops in Mexico Not Determined.

El Paso, May 8.—A conference today between Generals Scott and Funston and Obregon, Mexican war minister, and Juan Amador, sub-treasurer of foreign affairs, ended without any agreement being reached regarding the status of American troops in Mexico.

While nothing was given out officially, it is understood the conference dealt largely with a recent raid in the Big Bend section of Texas and will be taken to disperse the bandits in Coahuila. It is said now the demands presented to the Mexican representatives would include the co-operation of Americans and Mexicans in the districts not suggested heretofore. Mexican representatives said another conference would be held.

While General Funston declined to say whether a second expedition would be sent, he said he has "not yet" crossed four troops have been ordered to Glenn Springs.

But other and more interesting pictures are shown at the recruit depot, the local marine corps recruit office told Sutter.


"I don't care about that," retorted Sutter. "I started in to see what happened to Mary Page and I'm going to see it through if it takes all summer."

### New Leviathan of the American Navy.



The Oklahoma, 22,000 tons displacement, 583 feet long, is the new Leviathan of the American navy. She has just been commissioned and is ready. The vessel carries ten 14-inch guns like the New York, the Nevada and the Texas, thus making them the greatest battleships in the world with the exception of the five ships of the Queen Elizabeth type, built by Great Britain. They carry 15-inch guns.

This photograph shows the vessel as she steamed into Philadelphia. Captain Roger Welles is commander of the vessel, and Lieutenant Commander Adolphus Andrews is the navigating officer.

## A Big Slump Wheat Crop

#### Harvest Estimated Half Billion Bushels, 150 Million Less Than Last Year.

Washington, May 8.—Almost half a billion bushels in the winter wheat harvest forecast for this year by the agricultural department in the May report. That is one hundred and fifty-five million less than harvested last year, when the world's record crop was harvested in the United States. Severe weather caused a heavy abandonment of the acreage planted last fall. In all more than four million acres were abandoned, leaving for harvest about thirty-three million, which is about seven and a half million less than last year. The report shows the Atlantic coast crop fair to good. Growth was poorest in central states.

## SENATE'S ARMY PLANS REJECTED

#### House Flatly Turns Down Army Measure and Sends It Back to Conference.

Washington, May 8.—Senate amendments to the army bill, providing for a standing army of two hundred and fifty thousand men and a federal volunteer force of two hundred and sixty thousand, were rejected flatly by the House today and the bill was sent back to the conference. The Senate measure, however, was approved in the form of a substitute by chairman Dyer. This provides that a nitrate plant be operated exclusively by the government. It is designed to slake the opposition which many "power" groups were opposing.
