15-Year-Old Bride Gets Five Years For Murder



Fort Worth, Texas, June 29.—Mrs.
Charles V. Harrison, bride of Charles
Harrison, a nephew of United States
Senator Charles Caberson, was ac-
cused of murder here today by a jury
after a trial of a week and statu-
ed to five years imprisonment. She
was charged with the killing of W.
A. Warren, a hotel proprietor. Mrs.
Harrison admitted the slaying but
said Warren had attacked her when
she was a mere child. She married
Harrison two days after the killing.

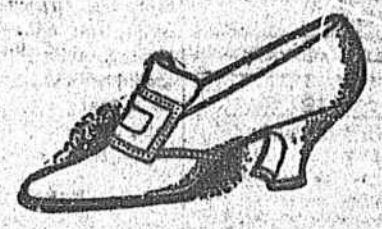
