FUNERAL TODAY MR. G. N. BROYLES

Well Known and Highly Esteemed
Anderson Man
Died Thursday.

Announcement yesterday morning in The Intelligencer of the death of Mr. George Nash Broyles, 201 West River street, at 2 o'clock, came as a shock to his many friends in this city. Funeral services will be held this morning at 10 o'clock from the home and interment will be made in Silver Brook cemetery, Rev. T. C. O'Dell, presiding elder of the Anderson district of the Methodist church, officiating.

Mr. Broyles death was reported at this office just as the paper was going to press yesterday morning, consequently only a bare notice could be made.

Mr. Broyles was the eldest child of the late Mr. William E. Broyles and Mrs. Mary Ruth Broyles, and was born 57 years ago in Whitefield county, Ga. He moved to Anderson county when quite a young man and spent practically all of his life here. He was reared on a farm, but moved to the city of Anderson before reaching his majority, and was employed as a clerk in Mr. A. B. Towlers' store, which was located in the Kay store room on the east side of the public square. He remained with Mr. Towlers for three or four years, and then went to The Bleckley company, the late Sylvester Bleckley having decided to take in business with him 12 young men of this section. These young men were made partners in the business and Mr. Broyles was one of the 12. He remained with this company for several years and then sold out his interest in the business. He went with Gen. C. A. Reed, and for 15 or 20 years was a partner in Gen. Reed's business. He remained a partner in the business until the Reed, Plano and Organ company was purchased by the Reece-Webb company about a year ago.

Mr. Broyles practically retired from business more than three years ago because of failing health. His health became impaired about six years ago, and although he realized from the very first that he would recover from the disease, he bore his suffering stoically and uncomplainingly. From time to time his condition would show some slight improvement as he would come down town and spend some time in his office at Reed's store. Several months ago, however, his manly frame became more pronounced, and he remained at his home most of the time.

Mr. Broyles was a staunch and loyal member of St. John's Methodist church, and before his health became impaired he was a steward of the church. He was always interested in church work, and always did his share in the work. He was also a faithful member of the Woodmen of the World and the Knights of Pythias.

Mr. Broyles married Miss Emma Wilson, and she and two sons and one daughter survive him. The children are Mr. Frank Broyles of Columbia, Mr. Joe Broyles of Anderson, and Miss Edna Broyles of Anderson. He is also survived by his mother, who lives with Mr. W. C. Broyles on Webb street, and two brothers—Messrs. J. M. Broyles of Fork township and W. C. Broyles of this city. Two sisters—Mrs. Fannie Holland and Lulu Gantt—are dead. Mrs. Gantt died about three months ago in Townville.

Mr. Broyles was a man of retiring and modest disposition, and always stood for what was right. He could always be counted on as being on the right side of a question affecting the good of the city, county and state, and his opinions were sound and wise. He was termed a good citizen.

The following friends of the deceased will act as pallbearers at the funeral this morning: Messrs. G. H. Geiger, Nelson B. Green, A. W. Kay, C. W. Webb, J. L. Sherard and P. B. Stephens.

NO PARDONED CONVICTS ALLOWED IN RANKS OF THE GEORGIA REGIMENT

Atlanta, Ga., June 29.—Members of the Fifth Regiment of the National Guard of Atlanta, which left yesterday for mobilization camp at Macon, gave the people distinctly to understand that there are no pardoned convicts in their ranks.

In granting a pardon a few days ago Governor Harris casually remarked that the man receiving the pardon could show his patriotic spirit and his determination to become a good citizen in no better way than by enlisting for service in Mexico.

By some misconception the governor's remark was understood to mean that convicts who would agree to enlist in the National Guard would be pardoned by the governor, provided the offense for which they were sentenced did not involve moral turpitude.

Immediately there was a flood of letters to the governor's office from convicts in various camps over the state, one man writing that he committed murder but the jury only found him guilty of manslaughter.

Cooperation.
Clemson College, S. C., June 29.—Five county demonstration agents in the state arranged for and had bought cooperatively, 3,000 tons of acid phosphate last spring at \$15.340 to \$16 per ton, delivered. Bill lading attached to draft. This was a saving of \$2.00 to \$2.60 per ton over car lot cash prices to individuals and meant a saving of not less than \$6,000 to these counties. This is a mere beginning. Each agent could arrange for practically all the fertilizers of the state to be bought in one lot (through the state marketing agent supplied by the U. S. department of agriculture, now located at Clemson College) for cash at minimum prices at a saving of approximately \$7,000 to South Carolina farmers.

The marketing agent is now at work on such a plan for use in the near future.

Weekly Weather Report.
Following is the weather report for the week ending June 27th:

The week was one of good growing weather, with frequent rains. Marked improvement is shown in gardens and pastures. On the other hand, the fields have become quite grassy, and cultivation was being pushed wherever possible. Cotton was growing rapidly, but is ragged in spots; the crop is blooming in the extreme southern counties. Much corn has been laid by, and the crop is tawling in portions of the southern counties. Improvement in tobacco continues, and preparations are being made for curing at an early date. Stubble lands are being planted to sweet potatoes, corn, cow peas and peanuts. Wild blackberries are plentiful.

Attacks Were Repulsed.
Berlin, June 29.—Fighting on the western front attained considerable violence at various points yesterday and last night, the war office says. British and French attacks were repulsed everywhere.
