G W Giles, who has been operator for the Western Union here has gone to Blacksburg to work for the Southern Railway.

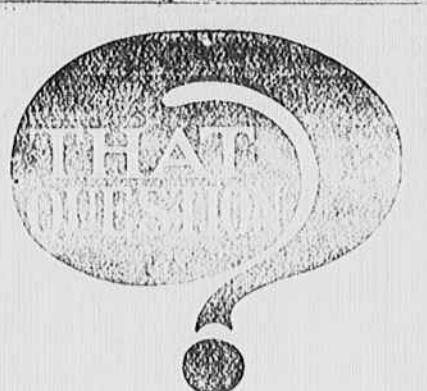

SPECIAL FAIR ATTRACTIONS.

Promise of the Best Fair Ever Held. Time to Make Plans.

All railroads have granted special rates. The buildings at the Fair grounds are being placed in condition to receive the exhibits, which will be more extensive than heretofore.

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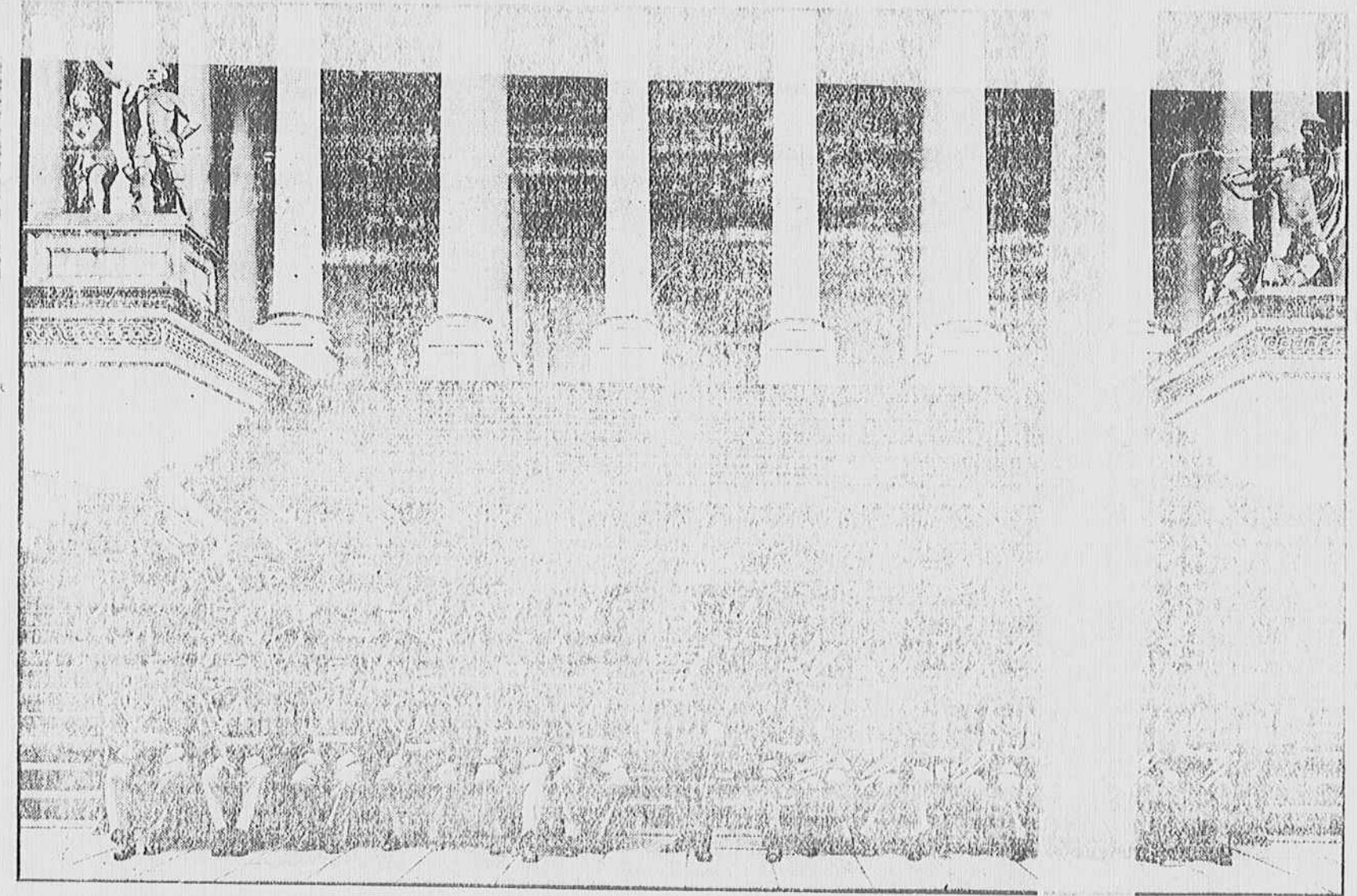
