The Sad Death of the Little Five-Year-Old Girl of Mr R T Blair of Texas

The subject of this notice, little Whiteford Stokes Blair, daughter of was born in Ridgeway, S. C., June 6, mas day. 1895, and with her parents moved to Timpson, Texas, in December, '99, where she died December 24, 1900, of a burn she received the day before by her clothing catching fire from a piece of fire that had rolled down closer to

her than she thought. Little Whiteford, though but 51 ears old, had won quite a number of friends, for all who knew her loved her. Her death was a sad event. Not only her parents and sister, but all her acquaintances mourn very deeply her loss. Her burn was a very severe one and she suffered very intensely from the very start, but during the time she did and said many things we can never forget. Quite a number of times during her suffering she would tell the family and attendants all to hush and let her say her prayers, "Now I lay me down to sieep, &c," and at the end each time, she invoked the blessings of God upon "papa, mama, sister and everybody." Just before she died she said hush, let me return thanks to God, and she thanked Him for His blessings and soon passed into the presence of
