He served in the Spanish American war in the 1st South Carolina volunteers. He is well satisfied, far, in good quarters, and supplied with good heavy clothing, and like better than volunteer service. He expects to be sent to San Francisco about a month for the Philippine service. He has passed two satisfactory examinations, and will have to do another.
