His Hogs are Fat.

"A few weeks ago I was greatly perplexed as to how I was to fatten my four hogs" said a prosperous farmer just the other day. "My corn was out, and the returns to be secured by feeding on corn bought at the present prices offered nothing encouraging. Fortunately however I had raised a good crop of turnips and so I determined to try them. In order to get the best returns I cut the turnips up and boiled them well. Then I mixed this cooked food thoroughly with shorts." Then he added with a great degree of satisfaction: "You just ought to see those hogs. I never saw hogs fatten more rapidly." What the above farmer has done should be a stimulus to other farmers. If turnips serve so well for fattening when corn is scarce they would serve equally as well in the time of plenty. Perhaps other farmers have the turnips but are not using them wisely. Turnips are not much of a food if fed raw, but they are fine if fed as above, and still better food can be made by souring the above mixture for a period of twenty-four to thirty-six hours.

But I haven't the turnips some will say. Perhaps not this time, but let this be a warning to plant an abundant turnip crop next fall.
