





JEFFERSON DAVIS.

An Unpublished Letter from the South's Great Chieftain With Some Appropriate Suggestions by Mr. Meares.

Dear Sir: I think the Confederate veterans, when they meet soon in Winnsboro, would like to read a letter that their president sent to a gentleman who had named his son Jefferson Davis. So, I enclose a copy of it for publication, as it has not been printed hitherto. It will not only interest them as a message from their beloved and revered commander-in-chief, as well as the president of the country for which they offered their lives to defend and for which he virtually gave his life, but it reveals to those who did not know him the dignity of the gentleman and the calm, clear mind of the great statesman that Jefferson Davis was, so that his words will equally interest and instruct the generation coming on to take the places in our Southern States of the old Confederate veterans.

That part of his letter beginning, "Force cannot settle a question of right," contains a truth that is unanswerable, and is so clearly stated that it ought to be taught word for word to our children who are learning of Jefferson Davis as a character in history simply, and from books and teachers, often alien and hostile to the principles of constitutional government that the Confederacy sought to maintain, and failed, so that the further surrender of the reserved powers of the states is going on in an accelerating degree to this day.

My Dear Sir: Please accept my sincere thanks for your kind letter forwarded from Memphis and received here. There could be no higher pleasure than that of naming a son after one who is estimated by the service he has rendered; and I acknowledge the evidence you have thus given of your esteem.

I send as requested a photograph of myself and with it my

prayers for the welfare and happiness of you and yours. My earnest wishes that every good may attend your son are cordially offered. The shadows that now rest on our beloved South will, I hope, be lifted before he reaches man's estate. That hope is based on a firm belief in the potency of truth and the conviction that the cause for which we contended is as necessary now to the happiness and liberty of the people as it was when asserted in 1776, and reduced to a more practical form in 1789.

I entirely concur in your opinion that it best becomes us, under existing circumstances, to yield a faithful observance of the obligations resulting from a reunion of the states; but this does not involve the admission that our defeat was a decision against the justice of our cause.

Force cannot settle a question of right, and they talk idly who say admitted the question of State-rights to the "arbitrament of the sword." Our revolutionary sires secured these rights for themselves and their posterity. Who of this generation had the function or the power to submit to the ordeal of battle the history of their successors, to install the fickle God of War as the judge of their political inheritance and that of their children and their children's children forever?

Trusting that your son, my namesake, may see the constitution restored to its early construction, and the states according to the compact of union in the full enjoyment of all the undelimited powers, and that all his ends may be his God's and his country's, I am

Let us reflect upon the goodness of God, who has spared us for other service and let us sanctify our remaining days to the service of the Lord of all so that when the roll is called in heaven, we shall no longer stand in decimated and ever diminishing ranks, but shall enter a joyful reunion and delight in an eternal comradeship with those who fought a good fight and kept the faith.
