### DEATH OF MR. R. M. BRICE.

Promising Young Man Suddenly  
Stricken With Heart Failure.

A shadow of deep sorrow has  
again been cast over the Wood-  
ward community by the death of  
Mr. Robert M. Brice. Mr. Brice  
was a son of Maj. T. W. Brice  
and was a leading citizen. He  
was a young man of rare business  
tact. He is well known in the  
business world, having been man-  
ager of his father's extensive  
mercantile business for the last  
ten years.

He passed away at 9.35 p. m.  
on December 5th after an illness  
of a very few hours. Death was  
due to heart failure. He was in  
his office and attended to his  
business until 12 o'clock Decem-  
ber 5th. At that time he said he  
was not feeling well and went  
home from the store and lay  
down; was up again about 7  
o'clock and took some light re-  
freshment. A few minutes later  
he again complained of not feel-  
ing well. He again went to his  
bed. The doctor was summoned  
at once and all that loving hearts  
and willing hands could do was  
done for him.

He was a dutiful son, a loving  
brother and a true friend. In his  
death that community suffers an  
irreparable loss.

He was buried with Masonic  
honors in the cemetery at old  
Concord church, amidst a large  
concourse of loving friends and  
relatives.
