The reply was more | * than eighteen thousand dollars and evgry dollar of it was given freely and without a murmur. The people are beginning to catch the spirit of the movement, beginning to realize what it is all about and the great need, and as a result they are giving with a liberality that was unheard of before this time. The plan of districting the county and apportioning the amount to be raised to the several districts proved to be one of the best in the matter of raising money. Another of the outstanding features of the campaing was the amazing results of the meetings held in the different sections of the county. So far as is known every district that held a meeting of the people and had speakers to present the needs of the Red Cross more than doubled the allotment. The only districts that fell below twice what was asked of them were those districts where no meetings were held and there is every reason to believe that these districts would have come across if they had heard the needs of the Red Cross as presentde by speakers at the different meetings held in the county.

On acount of some ex pense attached to the production of the pageant, a small admission fe will be charged. All of the other exercises incident to the closing of school will, of course, be free.

The exercises will be held on ar out-door stage which is to be erected immediately in front of the school building. The light wires running through the street nearby will be tapped, and the stage well illumina ted. By having the exercises outdoors, sufficient room is secured to accommodat any audience and in hea will not be disagreeable. While it is more difficult to speak in the open than in a building, the fact that the stage will be built in front of and agains the school house insures audibility over a large area. The school build ing will reflect the sound of the voice acting somewhat as a sounding board and it is thought that everybody in the audience will be enabled to hear.
