

April 26 and 27 the University will play host to the eighth annual meet of the Inter-High School Athletic and Oratorical Association of South Carolina.

Beginning in 1910 the first four meets consisted only of track events. In 1914 an oratorical contest was added and in 1916, championships in baseball, football, and basket ball. At the last contest forty-five schools were represented by over one hundred and fifty contestants. A larger number is expected to be present this year.

Free entertainment will be provided by the University for the representatives, and all contests will be staged under the supervision of the Carolina committee on athletics.

This gathering of the most promising young athletes and orators of the state affords our students an excellent opportunity to make friends for themselves
