Have Won Two Games
and Lost None**

MORE GAMES AFTER XMAS

**Crawford Suspends Schedule of
Intramural Football Until
After Holidays**

The Intramural football activities ceased yesterday afternoon and will be resumed after the Christmas holidays. Four or five days will be allowed for practice and tenement 29 will hook up with 4 and 5 in the initial after-holiday contest.

Three teams are tied for leadership at the end of the second week. Tenements 1, 6 and 20 have two victories each and not a single mark on the "lost column." Tenement 14-15 have thrown a monkey wrench into the system of the series by tying in both games they have played. The teams from 18 and 19 and from 11 and 12 have a standing of 500 per cent. Others have won no games.

Few men have been injured in this years series as contrasted with that of last fall when a large percentage were injured more or less seriously. Mr. Crawford is giving good equipment to the players and those that have been enrolled in the regular gymnasium classes during the fall were given instruction and practice in the rudiments of the gridiron game by Charlie Robinson and Jack Crawford.

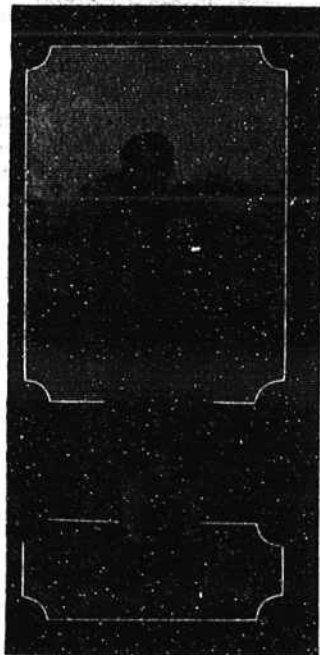
