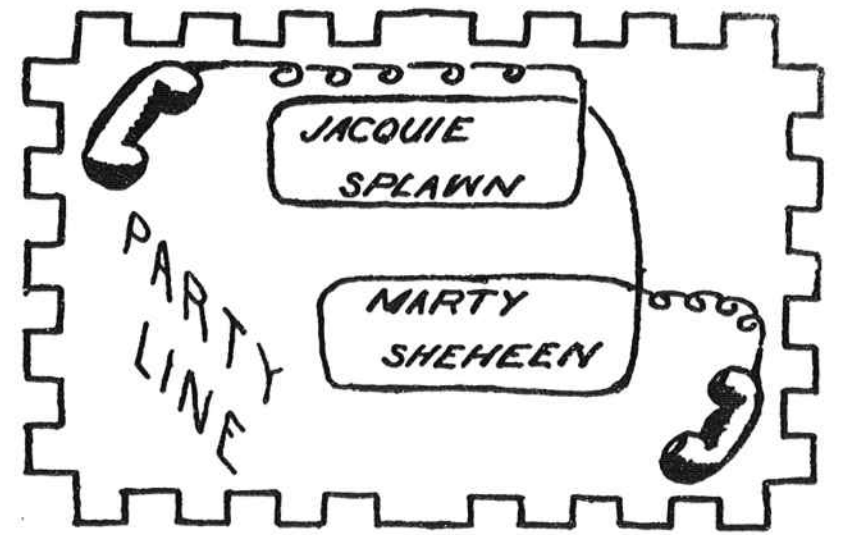




## Nurses Name Jane Boyce

## 'Mademoiselle' Will Sponsor Contest Students Tell Ideas For Improving USC

This year "Mademoiselle" magazine is again awarding prizes for the best articles written by an undergraduate, an alumnus and a faculty member and to the college periodicals in which each article appears.

This year, for the first time the winning authors will, in addition to receiving cash prizes, be paid for their articles if they are bought for republication in "Mademoiselle."

The contest is wide open. . . You may submit articles of any length on any subject as long as they're of interest to students nationally—a good short editorial or a humorous piece can win a prize.

Quality is what will count. Here are the rules:

Entries will be judged on originality of thought and writing ability. Topics should be of interest nationally to college students. "Mademoiselle" reserves the right to buy from the author any entries submitted to the contest, for republication in "Mademoiselle." The decision of the judges is final, and "Mademoiselle" reserves the right to withhold the prize in any category if no entry is of sufficient merit.

Winners will be announced by October 15, 1961.

Entries (no more than three in each category) must be submitted by the editor and the name and address of the author of each article. Entries should be sent to Publications Contest, College and Career Department, "Mademoiselle," Street and Smith Publications, 575 Madison Avenue, New York 22.

Only prose nonfiction published during the 1960-61 academic year (beginning September 1960) is eligible.

Entries must be postmarked no later than June 30, 1961.

This week a survey was made to find out what various students thought about student government. They were asked, "How do you think our student government can be improved?"

Charlotte Berkman, a sophomore, replied, "I feel that the status quo student government lacks nothing essential. I disagree wholeheartedly with anyone who says that the students themselves do not have enough governing power. Mrs. Clotworthy and Mr. Tomlin are often called upon to make decisions, though disagreeable to some, are done for the benefit of the students at Carolina. The professors and deans are here to serve as torches to light the way; not to suppress the student government as some people think."

A senior, Ken Wood, said, "It is my opinion that student government is probably the most effective student-sponsored activity on our campus today. It is the one place where most of the desires of students can, through the process of student government, be actually instituted."

"The campus administrators have shown great desire for working with the student government to make the campus more pleasant for us. There are, however, limitations to council's effectiveness, and the most striking of these is in the attitude of our students towards council. Some students seem to think that council has no power to enforce its bills, and nothing is farther from the truth. When the Monday night council meet-

ing ends, the work has just begun. Where we fail in our judgment of council's effectiveness is in our inability to realize what is being accomplished by them.

"There are many things we see being done we often don't realize is a project of council, for there are no signs publicizing the fact that council is sponsoring this or that particular thing. Another thing most students don't realize is that the student council can do a lot to help them in their personal problems. Council's effectiveness is limited by the student's lack of this knowledge.

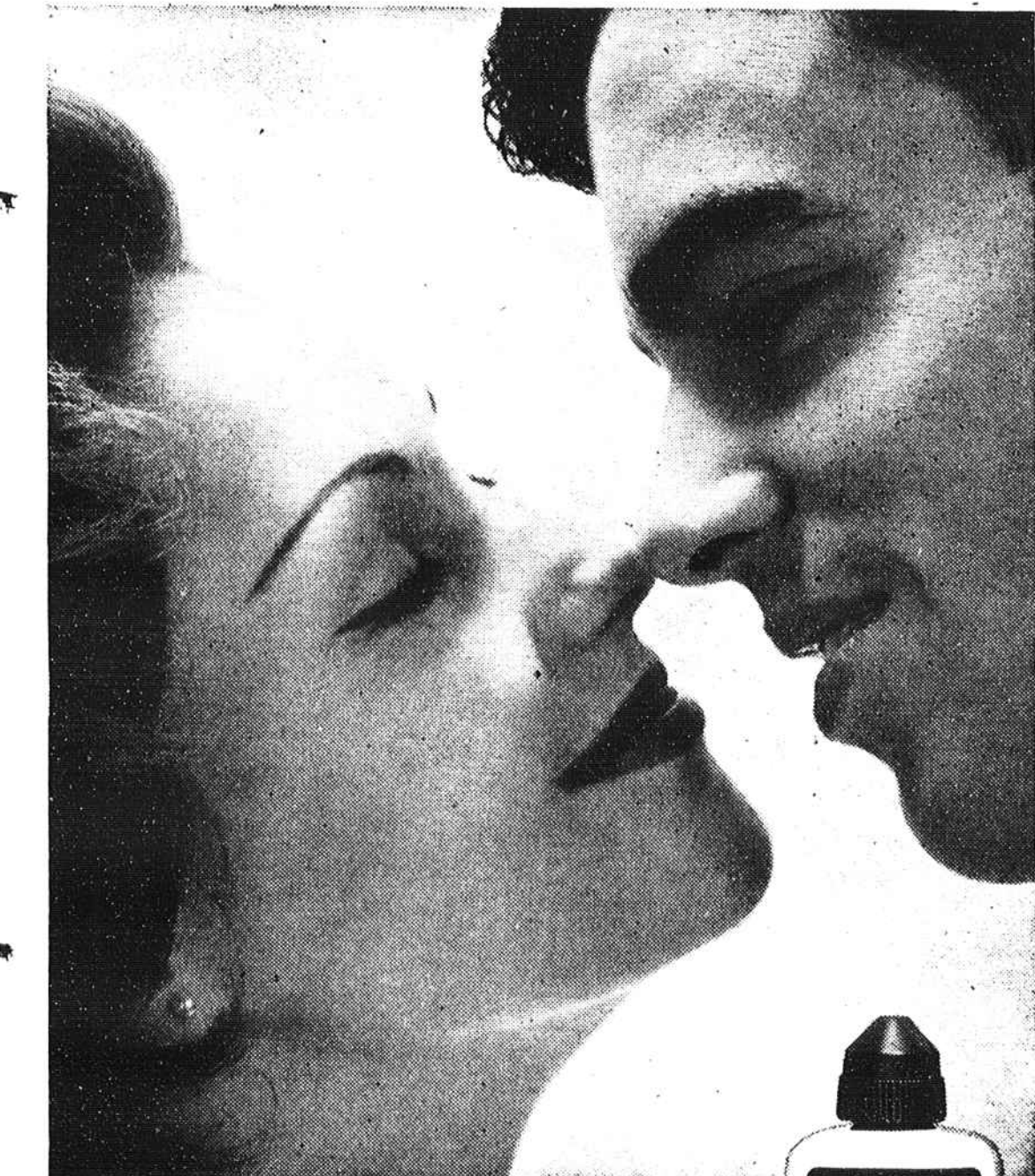
Mary Wallace Hilton, a junior, answered, "I think the council needs more authority, and much more contact is needed between student council members and the people they represent."
