Obesity adds more notches to Bible belt

WASHINGTON - Like a lot of people, the nation's weight problem is settling below its waistline. The states with the highest percentages of obese adults are mostly in the South: Mississippi, Alabama, West Virginia, Louisiana and Tennessee.

In the entire nation, only Oregon isn't getting fatter.

Some 22.7 percent of American adults were obese in the 2002-04 period, up slightly from 22 percent for 2001-03, says the advocacy group Trust for America's Health, citing data from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.

Alabama had the biggest increase. There, the obesity rate increased 1.5 percentage points to 27.7 percent.

Eight states came in under 20 percent: Colorado, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, Connecticut, Vermont, Montana, Utah and New Hampshire.

But their figures were all rising. Oregon held at 21 percent.



Televangelist calls for Chavez's head

VIRGINIA BEACH, VA. -Religious Pat Robertson suggested that American agents assassinate Venezuelan President Hugo Chavez to stop his country from becoming "a launching pad for communist infiltration and Muslim extremism."

"We don't need another \$200 billion war to get rid of one, you know, strong-arm dictator," Robertson said Monday on the Christian Broadcast Network's "The 700 Club," "It's a whole lot easier to have some of the covert operatives do the job and then get it over with."

In Caracas, pro-Chavez legislator Desire Santos Amaral accused Robertson of shedding his Christian values. "This man cannot be a true Christian," Santos said.

Last Israeli occupants leave Gaza settlement

NETZARIM, GAZA STRIP -The last Jewish settlers left Gaza on Monday aboard armored buses for Israel, ending decades of turbulent occupation long denounced as a stumbling block to Mideast peace.

Before dawn thousands of Israeli troops moved toward two settlements in the West Bank, where some 2,000 extremists have holed up with an arsenal of stun grenades, gas canisters and automatic weapons, defying orders to leave.

Israel has occupied the overcrowded Mediterranean coastal strip since capturing it from Egypt in the 1967 Mideast

Gaza has been devastated by frequent battles between Israeli forces and Palestinian militants.


