SENSATIONAL SHOOTING

Domestic Affairs, Not Politics, Was the Cause of the Tragedy.

Frederick Schaffhauser, civil engineer of the bureau of water of Philadelphia, was shot and probably fatally wounded while a work on the seventh floor of the city hall by Frederick Hornberger, a fireman at one of the city pumping stations.

The shooting was sensational and at first believed to have been the result of politics, but later it developed that it was the outcome of domestic affairs. Schaffhauser the past year had been much in the public eye, principally as the star witness in the criminal proceedings against John W. Hill, former head of the bureau of filtration.

Hornberger told the police that Schaffhauser had been intimate with his wife, and that her relations with him resulted in her death recently from disease.

THE GAME LAWS OF THE STATE

It is Published for Information of All Concerned.

The South Carolina game law is as follows: "It shall not be lawful for any person in this state, between the first day of March and the 15th day of November except in the counties of Bonafort, Barnwell, Charleston, Berkeley, Aiken, Oconee, Lexington, Fairfield, Georgetown, Saluda and Clarendon, wherein the time shall be between the first day of April and the first day of November, in any year hereafter, to catch, kill or injure, or to pursue with such intent any wild turkey, partridge, quail, woodcock, Mongolian or other pheasant, or any time within five years from March 1, 1906, to sell, offer or expose for sale, ship or export for sale any of the birds named in this section; and any person so doing shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be fined not more than \$20 or be imprisoned not more than 30 days; Provided, that nothing in this act shall prevent the importation for sale of any of said birds. It shall be unlawful for any non-resident at any time to catch, kill or injure; etc, any wild turkey, partridge, quail, woodcock or other game mentioned in subdivision one, except on lands owned or leased by such non-resident, without having taken out a license to do so in the county in which said license shall be issued by the clerk of the court, good for one year, upon the payment of a license fee of \$25. All licenses and fines collected under this act shall be turned over to the game warden of the county for the enforcement of the game law."
