Fatal Accident.

M. D. Trotter was killed Thursday night at the home of Miss Anderson, two miles from Pickens. An American, the only eye-witness of the affair, claims the shooting was accidental. As reported, the woman says she was in bed, Trotter came to the house, wishing to warm himself at the fire, and in stooping over to pick up a piece of bark his pistol fell from his pocket, and was discharged, the load taking effect in the breast. After being shot Trotter picked up the gun, and laid it on a trunk, at the same time saying "Ten-shot." The coroner will hold an inquest this (Friday) afternoon. Later we learn from parties who were first at the scene that Mr. Trotter lived for several hours after the shooting, and made a statement to the effect that the shooting was purely accidental, and warned all against carrying firearms. As the night was very cold he stopped to warm himself seated by the fire while Mrs. Anderson was sitting in the corner knitting. In stooping for a piece of bark to put in the fire his gun fell from his pocket, and striking the fire-dog was discharged. Mr. Trotter was about 60 years of age, and was well spoken of by those who knew him best.
