The new Cincinnati waterworks are now ready to furnish about 12,000,000 gallons daily to the high service system of the city. This supply is not filtered, as it will be some time before purification works are built.

Shafting in use throughout the country is generally one-sixteenth of an inch less than two inches, two and a quarter or three inches, as the case may be, that is one and fifteen-sixteenths, two and three-sixteenths, etc. This is because it is generally turned from the rough iron or steel and one sixteenth is lost in the turning.

Vocal or instrumental music as a therapeutic agent has been found by Dr. F. S. Kennedy to be a useful aid in melancholia, insomnia, hysteria, family affliction, business reverses; delirium, pain and mental or physical fatigue. A German physician has used music to lessen the distress and after effects of applying anaesthetics.

Since 1891, the electrolytic copper refining industry has undergone enormous expansion, chiefly in America, and the number of electrolytic refineries in existence in 1905 was stated to be thirty-two, distributed as follows: United States, nine; Germany, nine; United Kingdom, six; France, four; Russia, two; Austria-Hungary, two. To this total of thirty-two must be added four refineries, which are reported to be working in Japan.

German military authorities are experimenting with a device by which the location of troops using smokeless powder may be easily discovered. By this device it is proposed to survey the landscape through pale red glasses. The flash of smokeless powder appears strong in red light, while ordinary objects are dimmed. By furnishing field glasses with the device in question, which is provided with screens of concealed marksmen can be detected.

The Heroult electric process for the production of steel is now in practical operation at Remscheid-Haston in Germany, and it is reported that the steel produced is much superior in many ways to that made by older methods. Steel of great purity and homogeneous quality is made from ordinary scrap-iron rubbish, melted and then subjected to the action of an electric oven, in which the necessary carbon, manganese, nickel and other substances required to produce steel of various qualities are added to the liquid metal. The oven has a capacity of from one and one-half to two tons, and is heated by a current of 100 volts. The new steel is said to be stronger and more resistant to wear and tear than the old-fashioned crucible steel.

The Red Howling Monkey.
The red howler (*Mycetes seniculus*) is a rare monkey of the forests of tropical America. It is an extremely delicate animal, and is closely remarkable for the extraordinary noises it makes. The cries it utters comprise almost any sound from a subdued moan to an angry roar, and it is hardly conceivable that they should proceed from a single animal. This is the animal called red monkey by Waterton in "Wanderings in South America," where an admirable description of its weird cries may be read. These sounds are produced in a bony cavity formed by an enlargement of the hyoid, or tongue bone. In appearance the red howler is an elegant little creature, well clothed with hair of a reddish brown color. Like the spider monkeys, it is provided with a long, prehensile tail, the under surface of which is naked toward the tip, but it differs from those monkeys in having well developed thumbs.—Westminster Gazette.

Nitro-Glycerine and Dynamite.
Nitro-glycerine is made by spraying ordinary glycerine into a mixture composed of one part of nitric acid and two parts of sulphuric acid. A scum slowly forms on the surface of the fluid. This is carefully skimmed off and washed thoroughly to remove all free acid. The innocent and harmless glycerine has then developed explosive properties of a fearful nature. Dynamite is prepared by soaking a peculiar variety of earth with nitro-glycerine. The first man to devise the present mode of utilizing nitro-glycerine was a Swedish engineer, named Nobel. He made millions of dollars out of the business of manufacturing dynamite and allied substances. Gun cotton is nothing but ordinary cotton soaked in the same acids as are used in making nitro-glycerine. Though the fibre must be washed, exactly as nitro-glycerine is, the mysterious transformation in its character takes place quickly.

Tough on the Cur.
A curious custom connected with the Serbian army is the manner in which most of the regiments carry the big drum. It is not, as in most countries, slung in front of the man who plays it, but is placed upon a small two-wheeled cart drawn by a large dog, which has been trained that it keeps its place even through the longest and most tedious marches.
