natural resources. I transmit herewith a report of the national conservation commission, together with the acompanying papers. This report, which is the outgrowth of the conference of Governors last May, was unanimously approved by the recent joint conference held in this city between the national conservation commission and Governois of the States, State conservation commissions and conservation committees of great organizations of citizens. It is therefore in a peculiar sense representative of the whole nation and all its parts.

The facts set forth in this report onstitute an imperative call to action. The situation they disclose demands that we, neglecting for a time. if need be, smaller and less vital questions, shall concentrate an effective part of our attention upon the great material foundations of national existence, progress and prosperity.

The progress of our knowledge of this country will continually lead to more acurate information and better use of the sources of national strength. It is not necessary that fit to the whole nation. this knowledge should be exact in every minute detail. It is essential that it should correctly describe the general_situation. The conservation of our sources is the fundamental question before this nation.

Columbia, Special.-With impressive ceremonies in joint assembly of the Legislature Wednesday with crowded galleries and side aisles lookon, Governor M. F. Ansel and Leiutenant Governor Thomas G. McLcod were inaugurated upon their second terms as Governor and Lieutenant Governor, respectively, after which the other State officials were duly sworn in as follows: Secretary of State R. M. McCown, Attorney General J. Fraser Lyon, Comptroller General A. W. Jones, Adjutant General J. C. Boyd, State Treasurer il. H. Jennings and Railroad Commissioner B. L. Caughman.

Governor Ansel's inaugural address was brief and devoted almost entirely to the development of the State natural resources. He advocated paying more attention to the conservation of our lands and forests and the development and protection of the State's water powers, pointing out what was being done in this direction by other States and adverting to the fact that there is now being utilized in this State 175,000 horse-power with that much more yet undeveloped. He specially stressed the importance of drainage, recommending the creating of a State drainage commission to investigate and report on the best plan to reclaim over three million acres now lying useless for want of drainage. He also dwelt on the importance of immediate action toward securing of the State-Wide Prohibition Bill better roads throughout the State.


