"C" Writes From Liberty.

We have been having some
real March weather already,
as well as spring and winter-like
in one week. Two frosty morn-
ings, one thunder-storm, two
very windy days and the back
mountains white with snow
three days. Now it is calm and
warm, peach and plum and
some pear trees are beginning
to bloom, the birds sing, doves
coo and the frogs hollow and
the busy bee sallies forth and in-
vestigates the fresh blooms.

Oat sowing was again cut
short by thunder showers; there
has perhaps never been as much
small grain sown as has been
this winter, and the land was
generally better prepared than
usual and the crops are looking
well.

The farmers are learning
slowly but surely that cotton is
King, with wheat and oat bins,
corn cribs and smoke houses
1000 miles from home. When
we learn to supply our own
"hog and hominy", horses
mules and cows on our own
farms first, then what cotton
we can after this is done, then
the south-land will be the gar-
den spot of North America.

The farmer can hold or sell
his cotton as the market will in
his judgement justify him, for
then he can roll out from under
the mortgage system now so
common, forces the cotton crop
on the market all at one season,
or in three months, conjesting
things. It is like the story we
have heard: Say it takes 15
bushels of corn to fatten a hog
"a man that would take the 15
bushels of corn and dump all in
to his hog at one time and turn
off with a lazy air of indiffer-
ence, saying, now fatten, blame
you" would be called a fool of
the first magnitude and properly
so. The same applies to our
present system of marketing our
cotton. Why not string the
mortgages and accounts out for
the entire 12 months instead of
the present system of making
all due in the three fall months,
better still "live at home" and
make our living there and leave
off the mortgages, come out on
a cash basis and we will begin
to live at home as we did before
before the war, we will then
know where we are at and can
look each other square in the
face. Will we do it? Why not
try it.
