FARMERS' EDUCATIONAL AND CO-OPERATIVE UNION OF AMERICA

LEARNING BUSINESS METHODS.

The Farmer is Taking His Cue from the Business Men.

The Farmers' Union is the only great farmers' organization that does not delegate its law making power to representative bodies, but adopts the referendum system. In this it differs from any other farmers' organization that has ever existed. Kindred organizations, such as the Farmers' Alliance and the Grange, delegated their law making power to representative bodies and this gave wily politicians and spread-eagle orators a chance to "influence" the body and inject into it schemes in which were hidden selfish and designing purposes—to gratify the personal ambition of the self-politicians. Other kindred organizations were also wrecked upon the dangerous rocks of partisan politics. With these bold facts standing out prominently as danger signals, is it any wonder that those who conceived the idea of the Farmers' Co-Operative and Educational Union wisely enacted in the constitution a clause that prohibits even a discussion in a Union of anything of a partisan or religious nature, and that any member guilty of such offense shall be expelled from the Union after a second offense.

The referendum system is the safety valve that protects the Union from the swaying influence of "stump speech" oratory that creeps into and controls representative bodies clothed with final power delegated to them by their constituents. It is true that the Farmers Union has its state and national meetings, but these bodies must submit to referendum vote all important matters to be passed upon by Local Unions before they can be called a law of the Farmers' Union. The farmers are learning business methods from business men. They have learned that when business men co-operate for the protection or promotion of their interests, they don't let political sentiments enter into their deliberations. Two or three good cotton warehouses in each county in the south, owned and controlled by Farmers' Union men, will be of more benefit and value to the farmers than anything they have ever received or ever will receive through any political source. One good warehouse in your county will be worth more to you than a dozen of your best politicians could be worth to you in the legislature. If it were our privilege to select the best investment of the people's money in the south for the next six years we'd put all the expense money of the legislature into cotton warehouses and let the politicians stay at home.—Our Home, Nashville, N. C.

High Grade Fertilizers.

Then plant about ten acres in shoats to feed all the waste you have about your place and when you do this you will not have to study so much about your big cotton crop, for by carrying out the above you will not have time to fool with much cotton nor will you need much cotton or money either for you will have all you need at home.—Winnfield, La., Union Banner.

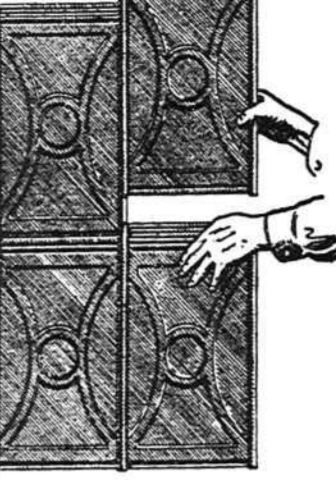

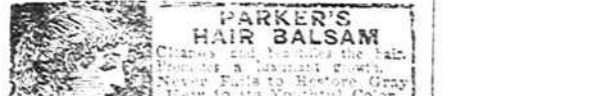
