P. F. Crawford of the Baptist church, our friend and brother was laid beside his wife and daughter to await the final home gathering of earth's redeemed.

Mr. Jeanes Mother Dies at Pelzer.

Mrs. E. Jeanes, aged about 70 years, died at her home in Pelzer, on last Friday, the 12th inst. at three minutes to 3 o'clock. She was buried the day following her death at Big Creek church, by the side of her husband, who had predeceased her several years.
