Griffin Baptist Church Dedicated.
 Last Sunday marked a new epoch in the history of this historic old church. The membership is not large, but are men and women of courage, faith and sacrifice. They have at an expense of about \$2000, erected the best, most comfortable and prettily furnished house of worship in this county. It is about 46x68 feet, seating 1000 or 1200 people. It is neatly and handsomely finished and furnished and reflects the spirit of the people.

As previously arranged last Sunday was set apart for the formal dedication of this handsome structure to the worship of God. Although some of the speakers were prevented from being present the services were beautiful throughout and highly enjoyed by the concourse of people present.

Beginning at 10.30 o'clock a song service of 30 minutes was conducted by Prof. McD. Baker, then the pastor Rev. W. J. Foster made an address of welcome which was responded to by Mr. C. E. Robinson in the absence of Col. M. L. Donaldson. Following this was a brief history of the church by Rev. B. Holder. who stated among other things, that this was the third house of worship which had been built at this place within his recollection.

The first house he said was built many years before the war and the timbers which went into the frame were hewed on the ground at that place, and that the total cost of the first building was \$500.

At the conclusion of this historical sketch, Dr. Henry Miller, pastor of the Pendleton street Baptist church, Greenville, S. C. was introduced and preached the dedicatory sermon. It was a powerful presentation of the subject "A Church." He argued that a church was a place where the spirit dwelt and if Jesus Christ was not in it and did not control its motives and purposes of the organization it was not a church. That the church was composed of Christ as the head and saved men and women as constituent parts. That the church was in the world for the salvation of the world and that it was the mission of the church to bring the world to Christ by and through its members. The dedicatory prayer was made by Dr. Miller after which a collection for State Missions was taken.

Luncheon was served on the ground and for an hour people sat and refreshed themselves and talked. Men and women met and had not seen each other for many years. Old friends of the long ago days renewed their friendship and talked over the times and things of the past.

At 2 o'clock the people reassembled in the house and engaged in a home coming service. After a song service, short talks were made by Mr. W. L. Jones, B. H. Williams, S. H. Brown and others which concluded the services of the day. It was a good day, the services were inspiring, and after the days of rain the people seem to be bright and happy over the sunshine and entered heartily into the worship. It is estimated that there were fifteen hundred people present.

It is confidently expected that is forward step by this noble band of Christians is only a beginning of better things at in the near future power and influence will be the great factor in the county, state and nation.
