At 2 P. M. the premiums will be awarded from the Executive Stand, at the conclusion of which the Fair will close.

At 3.30 P. M. a meeting of the Society will be held for the election of officers for ensuing year.
Each morving of the week, from 9 till 10 o'clock, will be devoted by the respective Committees to plowing matches and tests of all kinds of implements. Plowmen are expected to furnish their own teams.

Committees will meet at the Secretary's office at 9 o'clock of each day.
Animals may be exhibited under more than one class at the same Fair.
