American Patrol Vessel Lost: One Officer and Twenty Men

(By Associated Press)

Washington, Nov. 7.-Navy department is today awaiting complete report torpedoing of the American patrol vessel Alcedo, which was sunk in the war zone early Monday with the probable loss of one officer and 20 men. Seventy-one were rescued, but little hope is held for those reported missing, as the vessel sunk in four minutes after being hit.

Washington, Nov. 6 .- The Amerian patrol boat Alcedo was torpodoed and sunk by a German submarine in the war zone early Monday morning and one officer and twenty enlisted men are missing. The Alcedo, a converted yacht, carried a crew of seven officers and eighty-five men. The Navy Department announced the disaster tonight in this statement:

"The Navy Department has been dvised by Vice Admiral Sims, at Okla 10:30 a. m., November 4, the Amerian patrol boat Alcedo, a converted racht, was torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine in the war zone. One officer and twenty men are missing. The ship sank in four minutes
