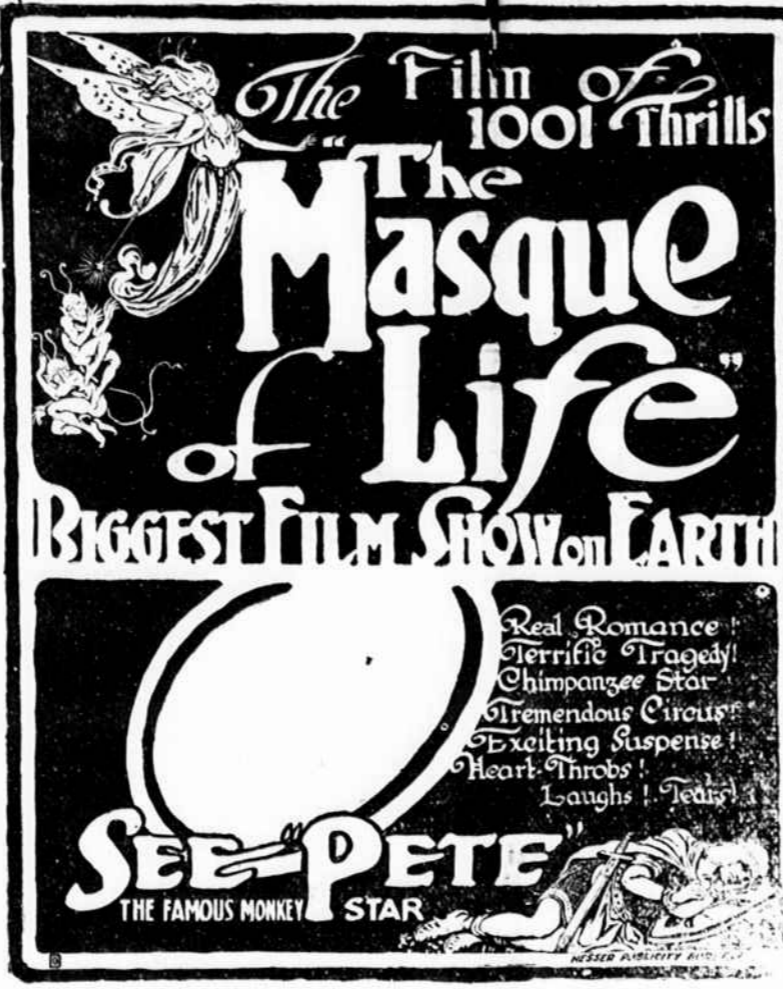

Improved Motor—The motor is of an improved design. The cooling is by water pump. The oil pump has been changed to the gear type. The pump is placed in the forward end of the cylinder casting and a fan is mounted on the water pump shaft.
Tire Carrier—Tire carrier is provided and is fastened at the rear of the body.
New Oil Pressure Gauge—A new oil pressure gauge has been mounted on the instrument board.
Demountable Rims—Wheels are fitted with demountable rims; one extra rim is furnished.
New Radiator—The radiator is new, of an improved type, and is fitted with a connection for a smaller diameter water hose.
Foot rail; robe rail; tilted windshield; one-man top; improved type curtains, folding up into the top; flags on top of each door for protection of the body and finish; pockets on the inside of each door; kick pad added at the rear of front seat; front and rear fender skirts extended to meet the radiator splash guard and the rear splash guard on the body.

The soldier's greatest joy, according to the men who have been there, is a cigarette. Every quarter contributed means one boy happy, and will buy a 45-cent kit of tobacco and cigarettes, and the kit contains enough to last a hard smoker one week. Sir Edward Ward, director general of voluntary organization in England, who has had actual experience in dealing with the soldiers' needs, wrote to the promoters of the tobacco fund as follows:
"I want to appeal to you to continue and if possible to extend this branch of your work by providing ever greater quantities of tobacco and cigarettes for distribution to the troops. No luxury is more appreciated by the soldiers than gifts of this nature."

Union Man Invents Electric Fire Starting Device.

Mr. John M. Keck of Gage Avenue, who is quite an electrical genius, has invented an electrical device for starting a fire in a grate. This electrical device consists of two flashlight dry cell batteries connected to an ordinary alarm clock. The alarm clock electrically connected to two electric wire coils. A match with the stem cut short is placed in a cuff on a short curved steel arm. The clock is set to alarm at the desired time, and when the alarm is made the current from the batteries rushes to the two wire coils, forming an electric magnet. This magnet draws the trigger on the curved arm, and releases it by means of a strong steel spring drawing the match in the cuff across a rainbow shaped file igniting it, and throwing the match in the grate. The match soon catches to the paper and kindling (which has been prepared beforehand) and in a few minutes you have a fire. Of course the paper and kindling are in the grate preparatory to setting the device.

Mr. Keck says he has known this device to fail only one time, and that was the fault of his, by not having the device placed near enough to the grate.

This device is both practical and useful, and was invented by Mr. Keck and made by Mr. W. M. Whitenner, an expert mechanic of this city.
