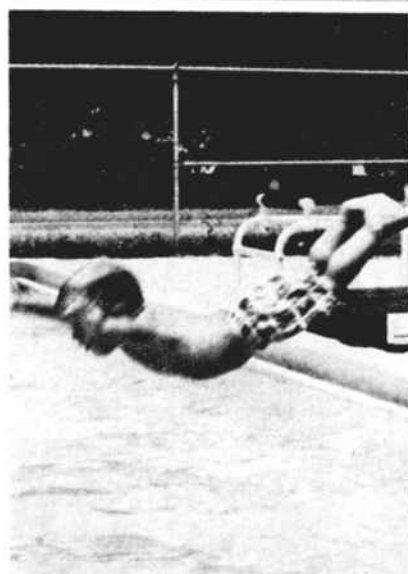
Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Harmon observed a wedding anniversary August 3.
