'We Loaded 55 Tons A Day'

"In 1943 I was working on the Clyde McCrary farm as a share cropper and day laborer, and had a chance to come to work at Clinton Mills," says James D. Werts, a Clinton Maintenance employee."

"As a day laborer, I got anywhere from 75c to a dollar a day, and the job here paid \$19 a week," he recalled.

Werts has had a variety of jobs since coming here almost thirty three years ago. During one period, I helped a crew move a number of houses at Lydia; for another period I was assigned to clean the rest rooms, and in 1970, was transferred into the Supply

"Back in the 40's," he recalled, "a group of us use to roll up to 55 tons of coal a day to the stoker to fire the boiler.'

Werts, who is known by his friends often as just "Rat" discussed his nickname with the

"I was living at Tip Top, about seven miles out of Clinton when I came to work, and I drove an old '36 Ford. The first time Mr. Bailey saw me, he called me Rat, and that name has stuck with me ever since."

In addition to his Supply Room responsibilties, Werts also picks up company mail at the Post Office each morning.
