



Bailey Plant Employees Earn Safety Award From SCTMA

Clinton Mills' Bailey Plant won second place in Group III (under the 750,000) of the South Carolina Textile Manufacturers' Association (SCTMA) 1983 Safety Contest. Employees at the Bailey Plant worked 499,997 hours in 1983 without a single accident resulting in a lost day of work. Textile plants were classified according to the number of "man hours" worked during 1983. Milliken and Company's Saluda Plant won first place in the same group completing 1983 with 568,711 accident-free hours. Awards were presented by Commissioner of Labor Ed McGowan at the closing session of the SCTMA Plant Managers' Division meeting at Hilton. More than 170 textile plants entered the competition.
