

Rejoicing in Russia.

Great Demonstrations Throughout the Empire --Scenes Enacted Never Before Witnessed in Russia.

St. Petersburg, Oct. 31.—The Russian capital this morning blossomed out with flags and bunting. All troops were withdrawn from the streets and the city presented almost a normal appearance. The nervousness of the people has suddenly disappeared. Workmen by thousands have flocked back to the shops and factories without awaiting permission of the strike committee.

Last night's demonstrations continued almost until morning. A procession of five thousand with red flags paraded, singing the "Marseillaise" and moved to the Russian bastille where for an hour they made the welkin ring with revolutionary songs. At Warsaw the military patrols have been withdrawn.

Before noon celebrations began and the city soon appeared to have gone mad. Such scenes were never before witnessed in Russia. Unrestrained by word or deed the crowds did and said what they liked. Despotism seemed suddenly to have been replaced by license. Red flags were everywhere in evidence.

In the churches devout men and women on bended knees before the image of St. Nicholas, the miracle worker, rendered thanks for the blessings of liberty while at the corners of thronged streets orators harangued the populace.

Suicide at Eighty-Five.

Indianapolis, Ind.,—Despondent because he felt that he had outlived his usefulness, Capt. James G. Wright, eighty-five years old, killed himself yesterday by shooting himself in the head. Wright had been a steamboat captain on boats plying the Ohio and Mississippi rivers. He was a man of means, having been at different times a banker at Madison, Ind., and Fort Worth, Tex.

More Russian Riots---Nineteen Wounded in Moscow.

Moscow, Oct. 29.—Nineteen wounded men have been brought to the University Hospital as the result of an encounter between students and Royalists. The Governor General has issued a proclamation warning the Royalists, who wish to attack the Liberals, that this will not be permitted.

The city is entirely isolated—Prices for food are mounting higher and higher.

—Yesterday's dispatches are to the effect that rioting has been resumed in Russia. Five thousand persons were killed or wounded in Odessa Thursday.
