

Situation in Russia

Czar about to Lose His Last Prop--The Army in a Ferment.

St. Petersburg, November, 26. —The successful mutiny of the sailors at Sebastopol, accompanied by the first open revolt of an entire regiment of troops, has created the greatest alarm in Government circles, and no attempt is made to disguise the seriousness of this latest crisis.

The army is the last prop of the Government. Mutiny is contagious and the epidemic of revolt which has attacked in turn practically all the units of the navy from Valdivostok to Cronstadt, it is now feared, is destined similarly to spread through the army.

Ugly reports have been repeatedly circulated of sedition among the soldiers in Manchuria, and it was specifically reported a week ago that Gen. Linevitch had to put down a mutiny with considerable bloodshed, and that subsequently he executed forty-two officers. No confirmation of this report was obtainable, but whether it be true or not, the morale of the troops on garrison duty in Russia has certainly everywhere been shaken by the revolutionary propaganda, and the fidelity of individual units, even of the guard regiment, is questioned.

New Ordinances.

AN ordinance prohibiting any person or persons from digging any Grave or interring any Human Body in those parts of the Cemeteries of the Town of Lancaster designated as "Free" in existing ordinances of said town, excepting person or persons residing within the corporate limits of said town.

"Be it ordained by the town Council of Lancaster in Council assembled and by the authority of the same: That on and after the passage of this ordinance it shall be unlawful for any person or persons (excepting residents of the town of Lancaster) to dig any Grave or to inter any Human Body in those parts of the cemeteries of said town designated in existing ordinances as "Free."

"That any violation of the provisions of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not less than twenty dollars or imprisonment of not less than thirty days.

"That all ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

"Done and ratified this 25th day of November, 1905.

AN ordinance prohibiting any person or persons from bringing into the town of Lancaster from any point within the State of South Carolina, either as agent of the purchaser or vendor, any alcoholic liquors.

"Be it ordained by the town Council of Lancaster in Council assembled and by the authority of the same: That from and after the passage of this ordinance it shall be unlawful for any person or persons, whether acting as agent of the purchaser or vendor, to carry, transport or bring into the town of Lancaster from any point within the State of South Carolina, any alcoholic liquors.

"Any person or persons violating the terms of this ordinance shall be punished by a fine of not more than one hundred dollars or suffer imprisonment for not more than thirty days.

"Done and ratified in Council assembled this 25th day of November one thousand nine hundred and five.

Notice to Taxpayers.

Taxes will be due and payable without penalty from October 15 to December 31, 1905.

The tax levy for State purposes is 5 1/2 mills, for ordinary county purposes 4 1/2 mills, special county purposes (L. & C. R. R. bonds) 2 mills, constitutional tax for school purposes 3 mills, making a total levy of 15 mills on all taxable property of the county. In School Districts Nos. 5, 30, 32 and 46, there is a special levy of 2 mills additional for school purposes; in District No. 24, 3 mills; Districts Nos. 12, 17 and 39, 4 mills; District No. 38, 5 mills; No. 14, 6 mills, and No. 40, 7 mills. In Cane Creek Township there is a special local levy of 4 1/2 mills for railroad purposes; Gills Creek, 5 mills, and Pleasant Hill, 3 mills.

There is also a tax of one dollar on each male citizen between the ages of twenty-one and sixty years, except ex-Confederate soldiers and sailors, or those who are so disabled that they cannot earn a support by manual labor.
