New Ordinances.

AN ordinance prohibiting any person or persons from digging any Grave or inter-ing any Human Body in those parts of the Cemeteries of the Town of Lancaster desi-guated as "Free" in existing ordinances of said town, excepting person or persons residing within the corporate limits of said town

"Be it ordained by the town Council of Lancaster in council assembled and by the authority of the same: That on and after the passage of this ordinance it shall be unlawful for any person or persons (except-ing residents of the town of Lancaster) to dig any Grave or to inter any Human Body in those parts of the cemeteries of said town designated in existing ordinances as "Free."


