### Bradford's Springs.

It is a circumstance of no small importance to the citizens of this State to have a convenient and healthy situation, to which they can have access during the Summer and Autumnal months.

The Bradford Spring, at this time, exhibit such a situation. The buildings here, are capacious and convenient; and are as well calculated for the accommodation of the delicate and infirm, as those who are in search of pleasure.

The situation is, probably, one of the most eligible that this country affords. The elevation is considerably above the common level of the surface. The rise and declivity of the hill is gradual and regular: and its summit smooth and unbroken. The Springs empty out of the basis of the hill, at different apertures, where it abruptly breaks off, in almost, a perpendicular descent.

The water is a strong mineral. It is transparent and palatable. The ingredients, which form the composition of this mineral, have not yet been accurately ascertained by chemical analysis. A few individuals have annually visited those Springs, and those alone, can form an adequate idea of the advantage which results from attending them.

The ruinous condition of the buildings in all probability, and the want of accommodation has, hitherto, prevented a number of persons from attending these Springs. But the subscriber flatters himself that he is now, well prepared for the accommodation of a number of persons. And he pledges himself to spare no exertions to render the situation of all those who attend these Springs both comfortable and agreeable.

### SCIENTIFIC.

FROM THE COLUMBIA TELESCOPE.

### MINERAL SPRINGS,

Near York Court-House, in the State of South-Carolina.

At the request of R. Clendinin, Esq. I have drawn up the following account of the Mineral Water, in the vicinity of York Court House, lately brought into notice and not yet publicly known. My sources of information are the annexed letter of Mr. Clendinin; and an analysis of the water, made by Mr. L'Herminier, a truly scientific chemist, who was resident not long since in the city of Charleston, and whose removal from our state we have much reason to regret. Although I have not had an opportunity to examine this water, my knowledge of the skill and integrity of Mr. L'Herminier is such, as induces me to put the utmost confidence in his statement of the properties, and therefore to recommend it to the attention of my fellow citizens.

Had Mr. L'Herminier remained in this state, there would have been no occasion for my taking any part in this business; but as the detail of the whole of his analysis, although very interesting to scientific characters, would not probably meet with general acceptance, I have concluded, with the consent and by the desire of Mr. Clendinin, to make such a summary of it, as will answer the useful purposes for which it was intended.

COPY OF MR. CLENDININ'S LETTER.

York C. H. August 29, 1818.

Dear Sir.—By the recommendation of my particular friend, Mr. Joel H. Poinsett, of Charleston, I have taken the liberty of sending you, through the hand of Major J. Wilson, two bottles of mineral water, the production of a spring in the vicinity of this village, two and a half miles distant.

The spring has never been brought into notice, until the present summer, about one month ago, since which time great advantages have been derived from it. It is found to be a strong tonic and powerful diuretic; in some instances emetic and in others cathartic; and it has been proved, in general, to be a remedy for chronic rheumatism, cutaneous diseases, ulcers, &c.

From the almost unequalled healthiness of this village, the cheapness of living, and many other advantages, together with the mineral spring, it is certainly an eligible retreat for the citizens of the low country; for their benefit, and that of strangers generally, it is desirable to have an analysis of its water published.—Will you have the goodness to send me the result of your analysis as soon as convenient, and in proper form for publication.

MR. L'HERMINIER'S REPLY.

Charleston, Feb. 11, 1819.
