THE Camden Academy.

THE Buildings erected by the CAMDEN ORPHAN SOCIETY, for the accommodation of an Academy, situated in an eligible and pleasant part of the Town, are now almost complete and ready for the purpose intended. A Master is wanted, to take charge of this Academy; and the Standing Committee of the Society, are authorized to contract with a person properly qualified to fill that station. It is proposed to grant to the Master, for the use of the School, not only the Buildings, and spacious enclosed grounds belonging to the same, clear of charge, but also to furnish fire-wood in winter, for the Scholars, to the value of one hundred dollars a year: And in addition to this, to pay the Master out of the Society's funds, a yearly salary of two hundred dollars. Also, to defray the expense of Premiums, to be distributed amongst the Scholars, to excite emulation, and encourage merit.

The Master will be allowed to take as many Pupils, as the Buildings will conveniently accommodate, upon the Terms, and at the Rates of tuition hereunder mentioned, and for compensation for teaching them, he must look to those with whom he shall engage. When the number of his Scholars shall exceed Forty, it will be his duty to employ a competent Assistant, or two if necessary, at his own expense. The Academy will be under the general supervising direction of the Camden Orphan Society, and immediately under that of the Standing Committee.

It is proposed to conduct the business of instruction in separate chambers, one for the male pupils, and the other for females; and every attention is intended to be bestowed, in order to preserve good manners and pure morals.

RATES OF TUITION.

For teaching the Latin and Greek Languages, Six Dollars per quarter.

For teaching the English Language, Geography and Mathematics, Five Dollars per quarter.

For teaching to Read, Write and Cipher, Four Dollars per quarter.

Proposals will be received from persons competent and willing to undertake the employment of Master, (conformably to the terms and conditions abovementioned,) by any member of the Standing Committee. The person employed must be a man of correct moral habits, and well qualified to teach the branches of knowledge above proposed; and he must engage to devote his undivided attention to, and exert all his diligence in the duties of his employment.


