THE CIVIL RIGHTS BILL.

The Civil Rights Bill, which was recently

passed by the House by a vote of 100 to 68,

was reported back to the Judiciary Committee,

with an amendment, making the first section read

as follows: "That all persons born in the U. S.,

and not subject to any foreign power, excluding

Indians not taxed, are hereby declared to be

citizens of the United States, without distinction

of color. But the individuals of every race

and color without regard to any previous con-

dition of slavery or involuntary servitude, except

as a punishment for crime, whereof the

party shall have been duly convicted, shall

tracts, sue, be parties to suits, give evidence

lor Barnum, of Hamburg, Conn., to Nathan Seely,
