

Affairs at Washington

Washington, Sept. 18, 1868.
Senator Moore was seen yesterday on private business. He sent his New York letter to Colfax by express.

The Senator says that Democrats in this country are not worthy of the name of Democrats, in their support of Grant and Colfax, or rather, in voting at all. They endeavor to prove that they are patriots, and feel that, as patriotic citizens, they cannot vote for the Seymour and Blair ticket and a new rebellion.

About two weeks ago, Washington was pleased with a number of party papers, announcing a Grand Democratic Convention to take place at White Sulphur Springs, Va., on Thursday, August 12, next. A large delegation was expected from every State, and the meeting was to be a grand affair.

It is asserted that named organizations exist, which are regularly officered, and drilled, and pretend to act by authority. There is not only no military organization in South Carolina, but the only military organization in the United States, the U. S. Army, has been reduced to a few scattered troops.

But, seriously, does there is any reason to believe that the people are educated by the organs, elevated by the press, or elevated to high positions in the government by a national press? The press is the enemy of the people, and it is the duty of every citizen to oppose it.
