WOODENWARE.

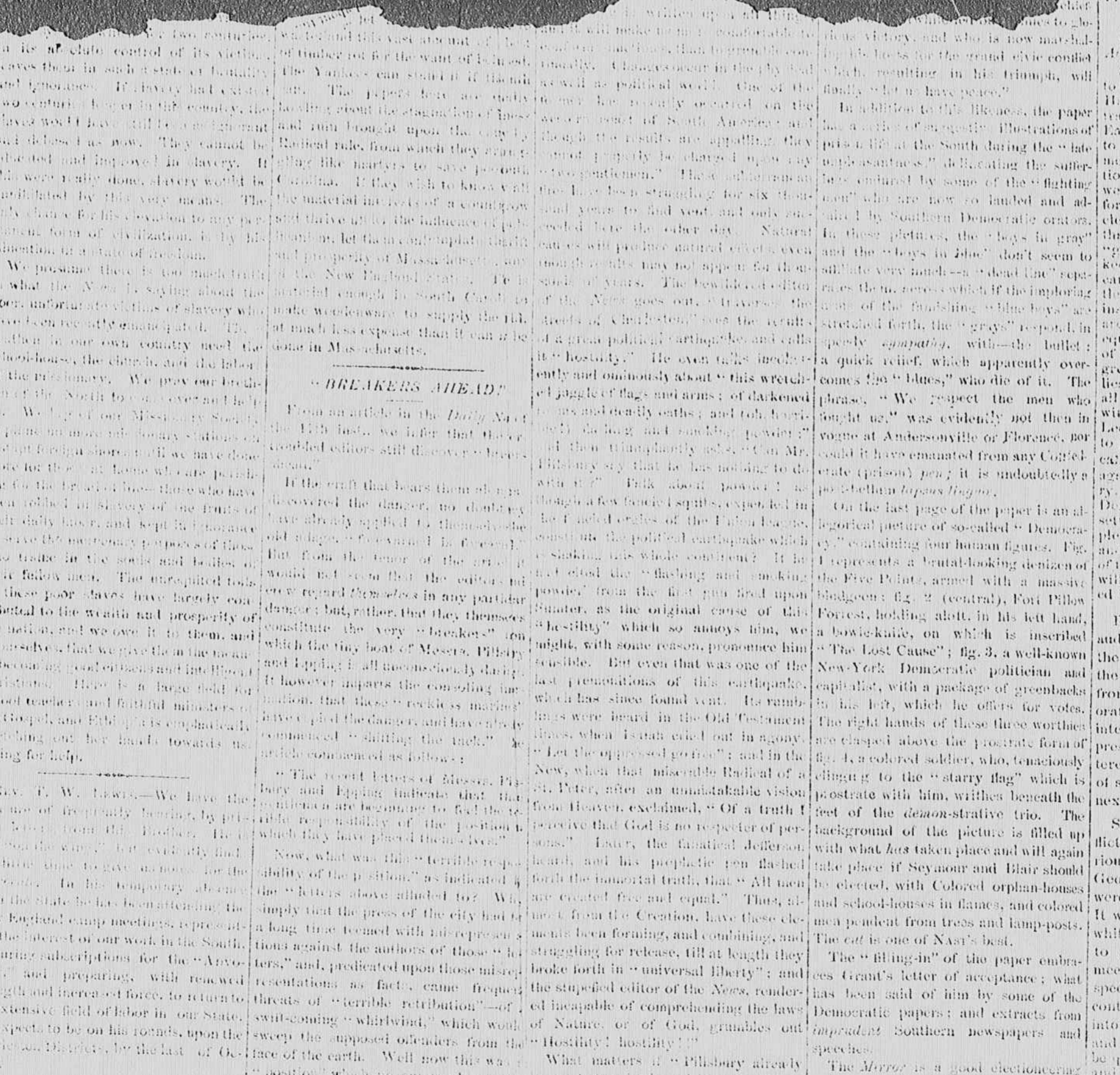
The Weekly says: 'The town of Winchendon, Mass., claims to manufacture more wooden ware than any other town in the world. Two of the largest firms turn out \$900,000 and \$200,000 worth per year respectively, and the smaller establishments of the place make up the aggregate annual product of the woods to a value of over \$1,000,000. There is more material for all kinds of wooden ware, oak, cypress, cedar, &c., within the reach of Branchville, Milway, and other villages near the Edistown docks, than would supply slaves, trunks, buckets, hails, spikes, &c., to all of South Carolina.
