FLORIDA CONFERENCE,

REV. J. C. HENNING—DEAR BROTHER: I write something of the political character of the Third Quarterly Conference of the Georgia Conference, which is published in your issue of the 24th inst.

Last Saturday evening I attended to meet all (if any) complaints that might be made against me in the Conference, which was held on Monday, the 24th inst. I was informed by P. E. that you were present, that he was sorry to be unable to attend, and to resign the pastorate, and that you were on the grounds of impropriety without any investigation as to why I had done so.
