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SEPARATE THE RACES SAYS BISHOP HOLSET.

The following extract from a speech of Bishop Holsey is clipped from the Georgia Baptist. As the Bishop arose round after round of applause greeted him. He advanced to the platform and spoke in part as follows: "When a man's shoes pinch his feet, none feel the pinch of the shoes but the man who wears them, so this racial problem of race question, as you may have it, outweighs any other question before the American people today."

THE PRICE OF VIRTUE. "The white man despises a coward. We ought to protect the virtue of our women."

"The white man before he will suffer one of his women imposed upon he will see the sun go down in blood and the earth covered with hail, and anything done to touch the virtue of their women will be swept from the face of the earth, and so in like manner, we do it in defense of our pure women."

"I would rather dig the grave and bury my daughter myself, than see her robbed of her virtue, for virtue and morality are the bedrocks of a nation."

"The Negro is great in propagation, and the Negro is also great because of his ability to take on civilization with all of its improvements, and therefore I am a free man from head to foot, hoof and hide, bridle and saddle."

"I am not for expatriation or deportation, here are my plan: Separation and segregation; that is, give the Negroes the state or states to themselves, say Oklahoma or the Indian Territory, or both."

"To it, men, you may call me a fool, I propose to keep on knocking at this question until congress will hear me."
