The Logislature.

The tax bill was passed by both houses after a great dual of discussion, and attempts at 'amending. The levy is fifteen mills, or one and a half per centum; five for the State, two for selectle, five for defi-ciencies, and not exceeding three for Coun-ty purposes—making fifteen in all. The following Ac's and Joint Resolutions

Act to repeal the general license law. Joint Resolution for the payment o

Act to make appropriations for the pay of one-third of the perdiem and milege of the members and other officers and attaches of the Legislature.

In addition to the above, a tax will be levied for interest on the Air-Line Railroad, in the Counties subscribing bonds in its aid. The whole tax in Greenville County will certainly be fifteen and possibly eighteen mille on the dollar.

Both Houses adjourned on Friday, 20th-inst., and will take recess until Tuesday,

The following is the Tax Act.

Be it enacted, &c. Sporton 1. That the comptroller general be, and is hereby, authorized and directed to levy and cause to be collected a tax of five mills on a dollar of all taxable property in the State to meet appropriations for the fiscal year commenc ing November 1st, 1872.

Suc. 2. That the comptroller general be and he is hereby, authorized and directed to levy, in addition to the general State levy hereinbefore provided for a tax of two mills on the dollar on all the taxable property in the State, for the support of publie schools, which shall be collected at the same time the general State levy is collected and paid into the treasury of the State. The same shall be the State school fund, and shall be kept by the State treasurer separate and spart from all other funds in his possession, and shall, under no circumstances, be used for other then school pur-

SEC. 3. That the comptroller general is hereby authorized and required to levy and to the City. cause to be collected, in addition to the levies authorized in the preceding sections of this act, a tax of five mills on a dollar of all the taxable property in the State to pay the deficiency of the year commencing No vember 1st, 1871.

SEC. 4. That the county commissioners of each of the counties are hereby authorized to levy and cause to be collected a tax not exceeding three mills on a dollar of all the taxable property in their respective counties, except the county of Fairfield, in which the county commissioners shall not levy a tax of more than one and one-helf (11) mills for the fiscal year commencing November 1st, 1872; the said tax to include the highway tax for the said year.

SEC. 5. The taxes to be collected in act cordance with the provisions of this ac. shall be paid in gold and silver coin, in notes, and bills receivable of the State.

SEC. 6. That all acts or parts of acts

SEC. 7. That the joint resolution, approved March 13, 1872, entitled "Joint resolution authorizing and directing the State auditor and county commissioners to levy certain taves," be, and the same is hereby, repealed.
