Mr. Slidell said the statement declares: "Other persons were about me, offering me friendly assistance, but I did not recognise any of them. Others were at a distance, looking on and offering no assistance, of whom I recognised only Mr. Doughas, of Itlinois, Mr. Tombs, of Georgia, and, I thought, my assailant standing between them. As I entered the lobby I recognised Mr. Slidell, of Louisiona, who retreated, but I recognised no one clse until some time later, as I supposed, when I felt a friendly grasp of the hand, which seemed to come from Mr. Campbell of Ohio."

Siidell said it seemed to him proper to explain his own position relative to this matter, as the published statement might cause a false impression on the public mind. When the Senate adjourned that day he entered an ante-room, where he remained in conversation with Messrs. Douglas, Fitzpatrick and J. Glancy Jones; and while there, was informed that Mr. Summer had been badly beaten by Mr. Brooks. He came into the Senate Chamber, but there were so many persons crowded around Mr. Summer that he did not see him at all, and he soon returned to the ante room to finish his

Having remained there for some time, he was passing through the reception room to go home, when he met Mr. Summer in the door, learning on two persons whom he did not know. His face was covered with blood, and as he (Slidell) was not on such good terms as to make it necessary to express any sympathy—aot having spoken to Mr. Sumner in two years—he turned aside and went out by another door. He had not the slightest idea, hefore the occurrence took place, that Mr. Brooks, or anybody else, had any intention of attacking Sumner, and was entirely free from any participation or counsel in the matter.
Mr. Douglas co. roborsted the statement of Mr.

Slidell, and said that when he (Douglas) heard that Mr. Sumner had been at acked, his first idea was to come in and endeavor to restore quiet, but upon reflecting that his motives in interfering might be misconstrued, he did not enter the Senate Chamber until the affray was over. The crowd around Sumner was then so large that for some time he could not see him. He saw Messrs. Toombs, Cr tienden, Pearce and Evans, all seated n or near their usual seats, but he was not near Brooks, as stated in the report. This was a total misapprehension on the part of Mr. Samner.

Mr. Douglas added that he had no knowledge

or suspicion that any assault was contemplated, or would be made, here or e sewhere. He did not approach Mr. Brooks nor speak to him, and was tot within fifty feet of the Senator from Georgia (Mr. Toombs.) How such an idea could have got into Mr. Summer's head it was impossible for him to conceive. The published statement might car ry an impression to the country that he was aiding physicians from arsenic. abetting, and was, in fact, a participant in the assauh; but that was an entirely erroneous idea, as he did not even know that Mr. Summer was in the Capitol at the time the assault was committed.
