

Mr. Dallas and the British Government. The London correspondent of the New York Journal of Commerce says the general opinion in London is that Mr. Crumpton's dismissal will be followed by the dismissal of Mr. Folias. This however, the writer does not believe, and he adds that great exertions are making, and by powerful means to influence the Government not to tender Mr. Dallas his passport, and the writer is of opinion that they will not fail. It is proper to state that Mr. Dallas has exercised no agency, directly or indirectly, on the subject; but there is such an abundant confidence in every intelligent circle in the metropolis, in the rectitude of his heart, that his retention is universally desired. The writer adds: "If Gen. Diego will give to Mr. Dallas the exclusive control of all the matters in dispute between Great Britain and the United States, he will have the pleasure of handing over to his successor on the 4th of March next a clear record as far as relates to that country, and a most satisfactory one as concerns the interests of the Union. It is certain that a successor to Mr. Crumpton will not be appointed until after the installation of a new President."

Mr. Dallas has the pleasure of seeing, and now have in our possession, a letter from R. W. Seymour, Esq., of Charleston, to Mr. Thomas J. Coates, congratulating him upon his full acquittal, by a jury, of all charges against him. As the various indictments against Mr. Coates were made matters of public notoriety by the papers of the South, his established innocence should be made equally public, as a matter of sheer justice. *Yorkville Citizen.*

A queer scene occurred in a prayer meeting in Essex, N. J., a week or so ago. Deacon Morris was leading the exercises, and after reading the account of the erection of the banner script by Moses, proceeded to remark upon the lifting up of the serpent so that the bitten Israelites might look upon it and be healed, when a striped snake made its appearance on the top of a partially open door at the deacon's back, writhing its body and showing out its forked tongue, so the small congregation of the audience. The reptile was finally strangled and killed.

On the 16th inst., in New York, an abolitionist named Brown was hired to re-deliver, before a large audience, no doubt, the speech of 'Sumner. [This is a new copy.]

Prof. Webster, of Portsmouth, Va., says the greatest mortality from yellow fever took place on the 25th of August, 1855, when the wind changed from S.W. to N.E., and continued in that quarter for five days—the barometer being low. On the 25th there was a drizzling rain, but no thunder. He asserts that the disease disappears where the electricity of the atmosphere has been restored to its ordinary condition.

The Black Republican Convention held their next meeting at Harpersburg, Tenn. They calculate that in a few years, from the spread of their principles, they can meet either at Richmond, Va., or Lexington, Ky.

Spain and Mexico.—It is stated that the President of the Republic, Mariano Paredes, has received the Spanish Minister, who comes with such favorable reports; tuppings in this train, and that he would not be a Spanish vessel of war left the port of Vera Cruz.

Father and mother and relatives were all killed, and no one knows the late founding's name or nation, which, however, is supposed to be French. The innocent was picked up unhurt amid the slain and maimed, in unconscious ignorance of the awful disaster. Col. Love sent it to New York, in care of the steward of the George Love, and it becomes, we suppose, an unknown object of charity here.—N. Y. Times.
