It is well known by these presents, that the SPARTANBURG AND UNION RAILROAD COMPANY, in the State of South Carolina, acknowledges itself to be indebted to the State of South Carolina, in the sum of FIVE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS, which said sum the said Company promises to pay to the said State of South Carolina, on the first day of July, in the year of our Lord eighteen hundred and eighty-five, together with interest thereon, at the rate of seven per cent per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of July of each year, and every year thereafter, until the said sum of five hundred thousand dollars, with interest thereon, shall have been paid in full. This is one of the five hundred dollar bonds, issued or to be issued to raise the amount of five hundred thousand dollars for the completion and equipment of the Road. To secure the payment of which, the Road constructed, and to be constructed, and all the property of the Company, is mortgaged to Charles M. Furman and J. D. Ashmore, as Trustees, as appears by their Certificate attached. And the said Company further agrees, that in the event of the said bonds and the unpaid coupons thereon at any time prior to the second day of July, Eighteen hundred and sixty-six, the Proprietor of the said Road, or any other person, shall be liable to the State of South Carolina, in the sum of five hundred dollars per share, in exchange for and in satisfaction of this obligation.

IN TESTIMONY WHEREOF, the said Company has become caused to affix its Corporate seal, and these presents to be subscribed by the President and countersigned by the Secretary and Treasurer.
