Movements in Arkansas. Little Rock, February 8.—The United States troops, in the Arsenal at this place, have surrendered to the State troops.

Yermonth Against Compromise. BURLINGTON, February 6.—The late delegates to the Chicago Convention from Vermont, comprising many of the leading Republicans of the State, met informally at Montpelier, this evening, and unanimously protested against the adoption of any of the proposed plans of compromise before Congress.

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The Border State Conference.

The following is the address of ex-President Tyler, on taking the Chair in the Border State Conference at Washington. It is a chaste and eloquent piece of composition, and has merits, in a literary point of view, that will repay perusal.

Mr. Stephens, of Georgia. The Committee on rules have authorized me to have a report, I will further state, that the rules have been taken from the rules of the House of Representatives of the United States Congress, part from the rules of the Senate, and the original of which the Committee are in possession.

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Mr. Shorter of Alabama, Mr. President, there are additional officers needed for preserving the records of this Congress. I move that the body dispense with the formality of an election, and that the Secretary be authorized to appoint an Assistant and a Journalizing Clerk for the Congress.

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From the Federal Congress.

WASHINGTON, February 7.—The President, through Secretary Holt, replied yesterday to Hayne's demand for the surrender of Fort Sumter. The Secretary says that the proposal of South Carolina, as now presented, was simply an offer to buy Fort Sumter. This position, he thinks, is sustained by the declaration, on the part of South Carolina, that if not permitted to purchase, she will seize the fort by force of arms.

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
