

FROM THE CITY OF WASHINGTON.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 20.—In the House the steamship amendment to the Navy bill was discussed and adopted. It was strongly resisted by Keokuk, Garrett and others. During the debate Stanton admitted that the present indications are that civil war must ensue if the second Session resigns possession of the forts and federal property. Stanton's force bill was debated.

In the Senate the tariff bill was passed with many amendments. The postal bill was debated, and an amendment to exclude the Confederate States caused a warm debate.

James K. Mariott, commonwealth's Attorney of Wake county, North Carolina, died on the 10th inst.

VICTIMS TO THE CHATEAU DISASTER.—The Mr. Davis supposed to be lost on the unfortunate Chateau, between Vicksburg and New Orleans, was from Clarksville, Tenn. His lovely young wife was a daughter of Col. Jordan, of Georgetown, S. C. There were strong hopes entertained that they may have been saved, but as yet no inquiry has elicited any confirmation of the hope.

THE GAMES-CKOCK STATE.—The Charleston correspondent of the Baltimore American candidly declares that the South Carolinians are the most military people he has ever seen. Differing entirely from the public and recent action of the Government, he says that the most martial and thoroughly disciplined military to be found at this time in America are in the State of South Carolina, of which every man at this time is a soldier. They are worthy of the name of Gamble, the ancestors of a large portion of their population, who were wont to declare that "if the heavens should fall, they would hold them on the steel of their lances."

LAVING IN SUPPLIES.—The Cincinnati Enquirer states that Major Hayne, of the South Carolina army and brother to Colonel Hayne, bearer of dispatches to Washington from Gov. Pickens, was in the former city in St. Louis last week, where he purchased and shipped for home 47,000 lbs. of pork, 4,000 casks of bacon and several thousand bushels of corn for the use of the Carolina army. These supplies were forwarded via the Nashville and Chattanooga Road.

FOREIGN RECOGNITION OF THE SOUTHERN CONFEDERACY.—The Washington correspondent of the Philadelphia North American (Republican) says, the prediction may now be ventured, confidently, that England will receive a Mission or Commissioner from the Montgomery Provisional Government; at least, such an impression is warranted by declarations, traceable to the British Legation at Washington.

BOSTON AND CHARLOTTE LINE OF STEAMERS.—A meeting of the Directors of the Charleston Steamship Line was held on Saturday forenoon, when it was determined to resume business, and the steamship South Carolina will leave Boston for Charleston on Feb. 23d inst.
