OUR WARRIORS AT OUR OWN DOORS. Madam. Editors: We have now before our eyes a most striking verification of the old saying: "Every man is a warm friend in a bright day; but night gathers the soulless scorpions." Our late reverses and the supposed critical condition of our Government have tried men's souls. We need no oracular responses now to inform us who are the friends and who the enemies of our cause. The man who predicts the downfall; nay, proclaims the death of the Confederacy, that he may dig up treasures for himself out of its mammoth grave—is he its friend? The man who rips open its ugliest sores, aggravates its worst maladies, and warns others to stand aloof—that with ears shut against the cries, and nose barred against the stench which he himself has raised—he alone may coin millions out of its suffering victims! Can there be any doubt of his present standing? Any question as to the side which he would take, did the enemy come within his reach? Such men are enemies of the deepest dye—more injurious than whole legions of the invading foe! It is time that a registry were made of such names; and that they were taken care of as the worst of incendiaries, the most deadly assassins! If it be treason to encompass the life of a Government, how can they be reckoned innocent of the deadly offence, who with the Government dead, and proclaim its desolation inevitable? Those who advise reconstruction—what do they but advocate the worst of all despotisms, in preference to our own free, enlightened, constitutional government? What more just, when, than that they should be sent at once where they can have it to their hearts' content—beyond the lines? Those who, now that the car of State is by all the power of the Government, aided by millions of patriotic citizens, urged forward to the summit of triumph—were found behind, clogging its wheels—would a thousand deaths exceed their deserts? War Tax Notice. ALL persons who are, or have been engaged in distilling fruit or grain since the 24th of April, 1863, or have sold Spirituous Liquors in any quantity since that time, must call at my office on or before the 7th Sept. STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA. EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT. Charleston, August 25, 1863.

WHEREAS, THE PRESENT CONDITION OF the country requires the organization of an active and efficient body of troops who may take the field upon a moment's notice to meet with promptness any sudden incursion which may be made by the enemy into our State; and whereas for the purpose of said act the entire arms-bearing population over 16 years of age, not in or liable to Confederate service, or exempted therefrom for public purposes should be organized into companies.

Now, therefore, I, MILLER G. L. BONHAM, Governor and Commander in Chief in and over the State of South Carolina, call upon the people of the State to at once organize themselves in accordance with the orders hereto annexed from the Office of the Adjutant and Inspector General, so as to afford our own and the women and children of our brethren in arms, the most effectual protection and security. The second organization called for is in accordance with the recommendation of the President to the Governor, and is approved as the best organization for all who may not be included in the organization of "Volunteer State Troops."

STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA. ADJUTANT AND INSPECTOR GENERAL'S OFFICE. Charleston, August 24, 1863.

[GENERAL ORDERS, No. 35.]

I. FOREGOING Proclamation of His Excellency the Governor, it is ordered that the following Volunteer State Troops be accepted into service, viz: One Regiment of Mounted Infantry to consist of ten Companies, two Companies of Cavalry and one Company of Flying Artillery. The Companies of Mounted Infantry to consist of not less than seventy eight and not more than one hundred men, exclusive of commissioned officers; of Cavalry, to consist of not less than sixty (60) and not more than eighty (80) men, exclusive of commissioned officers; and the Company of Artillery not less than eighty (80) and not more than one hundred (100) men, exclusive of commissioned officers. When the Companies of Mounted Infantry and Cavalry have been organized and accepted, Field Officers will be elected under order from this office.

II. The Companies authorized to be raised under the preceding paragraph of this order will be composed of effective men who are over the age of sixteen years, who are not subject to, or who are exempt from Confederate Conscription, and who do not belong to the organization lately ordered of troops for local defence and six months special service. These troops will be armed by the State—the Artillery to have a Battery of four pieces—but they will provide themselves with horses. Their pay (to begin when they are ordered into actual service) will be the same as that allowed in the Confederate service, including three cents per day for each horse. They will hold themselves in readiness for the field at a moment's notice, and to do service in any part of the State, under the orders of the Governor. The Companies will be accepted in order in which their rolls and lists of Officers are presented at this Office, and they will be attached to the Militia Regiments in which they are raised, until ordered into actual service.

III. In addition to the above organization, Companies organized in accordance with the Act of Congress of the 15th October, 1862, (heretofore published,) will be accepted on furnishing their rolls as required by said Act. And one of said Companies in each Judicial District consisting of not less than eighty men, exclusive of officers, and having its rendezvous at the Court House of the District, will be armed by the State. The remainder of the Companies will provide themselves with arms. Ammunition, as far as the means of the State will permit, will be furnished to all the Companies.

No. 28.—AN ACT to authorize the formation of volunteer companies for local defence.

The Congress of the Confederate States of America do enact, That for the purpose of local defence in any portion of the Confederate States any number of persons not less than twenty, who are over the age of forty-five years, or otherwise not liable to military duty, may associate themselves as a Military Company, elect their own officers, and establish rules and regulations for their own government, and shall be considered as belonging to the Provisional Army of the Confederate States, serving without pay or allowances, and entitled, when captured by the enemy, to all the privileges of prisoners of war: Provided, that such Company shall, as soon as practicable, transmit their muster roll, or a list of the names of the officers and privates thereof, to the Governor of the State, the Commanding General of the Department, or any Brigadier-General, in the State or Confederate service, to be forwarded to the Secretary of War; but the President or the Commander of the Military District may, at any time, disband such Company: Provided, That in the States and Districts in which the Act entitled "An Act to further provide for the public defence," approved April 16, 1862, and the Acts amendatory thereof, have been suspended, persons of any age, resident within such States or Districts, may volunteer and form part of such Companies, so long as such suspension may continue: Provided, That no person shall become a member of such Company until he shall have first taken the oath of allegiance to the Confederate States of America in writing, a copy of which shall be filed with the muster roll of said Company, as above prescribed.

THE ACT OF ASSEMBLY, passed with the view of enabling the Executive to furnish such labor as the Commanding General of this Department might deem necessary for Coast Defence, having proved ineffectual for the accomplishment of its object; and the danger to Charleston at this moment being so imminent as to impel him to improve the labor of such persons as have not heretofore furnished their quota:

Now, I, MILLEDGE L. BONHAM, Governor and Commander-in-Chief, regarding the labor called for of the last importance to Charleston and the State, and also to the success of the great cause which all have so much at heart, do approve of the steps taken by the Commanding General to obtain the labor necessary for the preservation of the country, and call upon all Commissioners of Roads to afford the Agents appointed by him every facility in ascertaining and applying to such persons as have not heretofore furnished their quota.

The thanks of the country are due to those patriotic citizens who have sent down voluntary labor. An earnest appeal is again made to such as have already furnished labor, whether voluntary or under the law, to send forward now, and promptly, all that they can spare.

I have, in addition to the call of the Commanding General, the assurance of Chief Engineer of the Confederate Army, now in this Department, that he deems a large increase of labor essential to the completion of works necessary for the defence of the city.

Town Ordinance. Be it ordained by the Town Council of the Town of Spartanburg, that from and after the passage of this ordinance it shall not be lawful for any negro slave or Free person of color to own or hold in their own right a horse or horses, mule or mules, wagon or wagons, to be used or hired for their use or benefit; under penalty in case of violation of this ordinance that such horse mule or wagon shall be seized and sold and the funds accruing from the sale of such property be appropriated for the public good of the town.

Be it further ordained. That from and after the passage of this ordinance, that it shall not be lawful for any negro or negroes to occupy any house or houses within the corporate limits of the town of Spartanburg unless owned by their respected owners in their own right, or unless some responsible white person remains in charge of them on the premises, or special permission be granted by the town authorities. Under penalty in case of a violation of this ordinance the owners of such slaves, or guardians of free persons of color shall pay the sum of not less than \$5 per day, for every day such offence is committed.

Whereas, the goats roaming at large within the town of Spartanburg have been often complained of by the citizens, and have been reported to the town authorities as a public nuisance. Therefore, be it ordained, that from and after the passage of this ordinance, that in the event that any goat or goats be found at large, and without the enclosure of the owners thereof between the hours of sunset in the afternoon, and sunrise in the morning, that the owner thereof shall be indicted to be made to answer in a court of common pleas and general sessions, or that the said goat or goats shall be impounded and sold at public outcry by the authorities of the town, and after paying from the proceeds of such sale all expenses accruing thereon, the balance to be held by said authorities to be disposed of as they may think right and lawful.
