THE following General Orders from the War Department are republished for the guidance of the officers and men of this com mand, and for the information of the inhabi tants of this Military District :

WAR DEPARTMENT. ADJUTANT GENERAL'S OFFICE, WASHINGTON, May 11, 1865. GENERAL ORDERS,)

No. 90.

Punishment of Guerillas. All the forces of the enemy, East of the Mis-All the forces of the enemy, East of the difference of the proper Commanding Officers, to the United States, under agreements of parole and disbandment, and there being now no authorized troops of the enemy East of the Mississip-ui River, it is

pi River, it is Ordered. That from and after the 1st day of June, 1865, any and all persons found in arms against the United States, or who may commit acts of hostility against it, East of the Missis-sippi River, will be regarded as Guerillas, and punished with death.

The strict enforcement and execution of this order is especially enjoined upon the Com-manding Officers of all United States forces within the Territorial limits to which it applies. By command of Lieut, Gen. GRANT. E. D. TOWNSEND, A. A. G.

By this order, those persons are regarded as Outlaws and Guerillas, who, by force of arms, resist the soldiers of the United States in the discharge of their duties - as has been done in Anderson, Pickens and Union Districts-or who forcibly seize Government property, as has been done in this and other Districts.

The most strenuous efforts will be made to inflict upon such offenders the full penalty of the law






