

The Radical Construction Plan.

The Washington correspondent of the New York World, under date of 22d April, says, in reference to the plan of the Reconstruction Committee for restoring the Union:

It has been given out in confidential circles for some days past, that the Radicals were maturing a general plan of reconstruction of the Southern States. But few were initiated into the mysteries of this scheme. It appears that it emanated from Robert Dale Owen, who, it is said, submitted it to the President. Yesterday the Reconstruction Committee met at an early hour, when the plan was unfolded to the Committee by Thaddeus Stevens. It is understood that the Committee agreed to it. It is more radical than anything that has heretofore come from that direction. It is in the shape of a joint resolution to amend the Constitution and professes to provide for the restoration to the Southern States of all their political rights.

Article first of the amendment says that there shall be no discrimination made by any State nor by the United States as to the civil rights of persons because of race, color, or previous condition of servitude.

Second, That from and after the fourth day of July, in the year 1876, no discrimination shall be made by any State nor by the United States as to the enjoyment by classes of persons of the right of suffrage because of race or color.

Third, Until July 4, 1867, no class of persons as to the right of any of whom suffrage discrimination shall be made by any State, because of race or color or previous condition of servitude, shall be included in the basis of representation.

Fourth, Debts or obligations already incurred, or which may be hereafter incurred, in aid of insurrection or war against the Union, and claims for compensation for loss of the service of persons held in involuntary servitude or labor, shall not be paid by any State or by the United States.

No State shall make or enforce any law which shall abridge the privileges or immunities of citizens of the United States. It is then further provided by Act of Congress that when ever the above amendment shall have become part of the Constitution, and any of the Southern States shall have ratified it and modified its constitution and laws in conformity thereof, the Senator and Representatives from such State duly elected and qualified, and taken the usual oath of office, be admitted; provided, that no person who having been an officer in the army or navy of the United States, or having been a member of the Thirty-sixth Congress, or of the Cabinet in the year 1869, did take part in the late insurrection, shall be eligible to either branch of the national Legislature until after July 4, 1876. The above will probably be reported to the House tomorrow.

The statement that this scheme is approved by the President is without any foundation in fact. It was submitted to him several days ago by Robert Dale Owen, but he gave no indication, by word or action, that he looked upon it with favor. There is authority for stating that the President not only disapproves of it, but regards it as a most dangerous and revolutionary scheme against the rights and privileges of the States, North and South. It remains to be seen whether Congress can be made to accept it.

A SIMPLE FORM OF FILTER.—A very simple and perfect form of filter has been devised by the apparatus of France, and deserves attention. It is made by placing in a tank, containing impure water, a vessel in such a position that a sponge which it contains, laps over its edge, and dips into the water of the tank. The sponge gradually sucks up and purifies the water in the tank, and allows it to drop into a smaller vessel or receiver, from which it may be drawn in a tube. By placing a few pieces of charcoal in the bottom of the receiver, filtration of the most perfect kind is effected.—London Lancet.

New York, April 28.—A letter from Dr. Bissell, on board the hospital ship Falcon, lying near the Virginia, at the Lower Quarantine, reports the arrival of the England, with 1202 steerage and 16 cabin passengers, and a crew of 122 men. Fifty passengers died of cholera on the passage, and at Halifax 150 died. The England has been quarantined. Four more deaths on the Virginia were reported on Friday night, and ten bodies were buried from the steamer. The number of sick now in hospital is 67. The Government hospital steamship Illinois went down to the cholera ship Saturday, to take off the well passengers.

THE CHARLESTON ORPHANS.—A grand concert for the benefit of the destitute orphans of Charleston, S. C., will take place this evening at the Cooper Institute. Bishop Lynch will be present and will deliver an address on the suffering condition of the orphans. The object for which this concert is to be held, should be sufficient to entitle it to the hearty patronage of all true Christians, who have means to spare for so charitable purpose.—N. Y. World.

A bloody affray between the whites and colored people of Carrollton, near New Orleans, occurred on Sunday. The citizens, aided by a portion of the Seventh Vermont Regiment, succeeded, after long and determined efforts, in restoring quiet. Several of the combatants were seriously injured, and three negroes were killed. General Sherman, on learning of the disturbance, sent two companies of the First New Orleans Infantry to Carrollton to remain until all danger of another outbreak had passed.

The Texas Constitution abolishes slavery, places freedmen on an equality with the whites before the law, and gives the Legislature power to guarantee railroad bonds for iron contracts. It will be submitted to the people on the fourth Monday of June.

The Vicksburg Herald says: The Masons of Warren County held a Lodge of Sorrow, on last Sunday evening, at Apollo Hall, in commemoration of the members of the fraternity who have died since the closing of the Lodges in 1862, in this city.

A mob has been endeavoring to rescue a negro, at Bowling Green, Kentucky, April 25, who committed murder, from the Sheriff, with the intention of hanging him. The Sheriff made resistance, and is aided by soldiers.

The Masonic fraternity of St. Louis, Missouri, have resolved to commence the work of erecting a grand temple in that city, at a cost of not less than one hundred thousand dollars.

Gen. Robert E. Lee's name does not appear in the list of one hundred and twenty-seven ex-Confederate Generals who have petitioned the President for Pardon.

In Michigan, at the recent local elections, the colored people voted for the first time, having recently been admitted to the right of suffrage.

The people's line of steamers to New York, Willis & Chisolm agents, have reduced passage fare to \$30.
